Participation Meeting.—A large and enthusiastic meeting was held in the Court House on Tuesday evening, to ratify the nomination of Lincoln. Speeches were made by Messrs. S. F. Wilson, Dr. Webb, J. F. Donaldson, A. P. Cone, and Morgan Hart. The boys of the green played "second fiddle" with pleasure and skill. Everything passed off pleasantly, and all seemed pleased with the nomination. A resolution was passed pledging Tioga county good for 3,500 majority for Lincoln.

The Adjourned Mass Convention.—A letter to the editor of this paper from A. G. CURTIN, states that he has accepted nomination to address the Freeman of Tioga county, on Tuesday evening, the 5th of June. He states also, that he has invited Hon. A. G. to accompany him, who may also be expected to speak on that occasion. As it is on our first week of court, there will address be an old fashioned campaign rally, as we had in 1856. It will be our grand celebration of the Chicago nominations. Let it be a turn out!

New Jail.—We congratulate the people of Tioga County on the fact that they are soon to be rid of the miserable old rookery, now as a place in which to confine human beings. In pursuance of previous notice, the commissioners, on Tuesday last, proceeded to the contract for constructing a new Jail in connection with a suitable Sheriff's residence. The contract was let at \$8,354, and was given to M. C. P. Miller, of Tioga—a gentleman eminently qualified and responsible.

The building is to be 50 by 75 feet to the extreme points on the ground, and two stories high. The front of the building is to be occupied by a Sheriff's residence, and the rear is to be fitted up with cells, &c., for prisoners. The building is to be detached from the exterior walls, being a passage of six feet in width all around, and are to be entirely above ground. The plan they are to be warmed with furnaces, and well ventilated.

Pathmasters.—The old system of road commissioners and pathmasters has been repealed. The act passed at the last session is titled "An act relating to the road laws of Tioga and Tioga counties," and the following are its sections:

Be it enacted, &c., That the act passed 14th of April, 1859, entitled "an act to consolidate and amend the laws of the counties of Tioga, Potter, Seneca and Elk be and the same is hereby repealed, as it relates to the counties of Tioga and M'Kean."

That the provisions of the 16th, 17th, 18th, 19th, 21st, 22d, 23d, 24th, 25th and 26th sections of an act authorizing the laying out and locating a road from the borough of Brownville in Fayette county, and for other purposes, approved the 13th of April, 1843, be and the same are hereby extended to the counties of M'Kean and Tioga.

That at the next township elections in said counties of Tioga and M'Kean, the qualified citizens of the street township of said counties shall elect three persons who shall be styled commissioners of roads and highways.

Any person who is not familiar with the provisions of the act of '43, and who desires to become so, will find the law in the Prothonotary's office, or with the Justices throughout the county.—Smethport Citizen.
