MIDDLEBURY AHEAD.—A friend at Middlebury writes us that on Monday last, a team weighing 2,100 lbs., owned by Solomon Bennett, Esq., and driven by Oscar Simonds, hauled 2,615 feet of lumber in the log, from Messrs. Bennett & Randall's timber lands in Chatham to their Gang Mill in Middlebury—a distance of 7 1/2 miles—a one load. Our correspondent adds: "When this is beaten we will try again. This is the largest load of logs ever hauled in the county, and if you will put a chain around the preceding State, the same team will haul them into the Union again all right."

Since the above was put in type, we learn from a reliable source an account of a load of logs containing 4,020 feet of lumber which was drawn a distance of nearly three miles, and part of the way up-hill, by one team! The team belongs to Mr. John Pierce, of Westfield, and weighs only about 1,700. We think this will give Middlebury "a back set," at all events, it will give her a change to "try again."
