MUSICIANS—L. P. Davis, O. P. McIntyre, Wagoner—John A. Piersol. They were paid the county bounty, last Saturday. Co. F, 11th Cavalry, Capt. Mitchell.

The most of this company are now under arrest at Fort Monroe, charged with mutiny. One of the company was standing guard, and allowed men to "run his beat." The officer of the day saw them, and the sentinel refused to tell who they were. The Major ordered him to stand on the head of a barrel for two hours in the sun, and his comrades, about twenty in number, rescued him from this punishment, hence they were arrested for mutiny. They were then, August 10th, at Burnt Ordinary.

Co. A, 1st Rifles, late Capt. Holland. We have heard nothing from this company since our last. Co. E, 1st Regt. Rifles, P. R. C. Capt. Niles. The Captain returned home on a short furlough directed from Richmond, last Thursday. Lieut. Mack, arrived here, also, on Saturday. They both look as if rebel prison diet did not agree with them. All of the company have been released except Caleb Fenton and John Morgan, and they expected to be exchanged in a week or ten days. They are now at Aquia Creek. Co. H, 6th Regt. Pa. Res. Corps, Capt. Carle. The health of this company was generally good when last heard from at Fredericksburg, Va. Benj. Seeley is here recruiting for the company. Job Wetmore, of the 6th Regimental Band, has returned, the band having been mustered out of the service. He thinks of going into the Ducktail Brigade Band. Companies, H, I, and G, 45th Reg't., Pa. Vols., are at Aquia Creek. We have no later news from them. Major Kilbourn has resigned on account of continued ill health, and is now at his home in Potter. Co. B, 101st Reg't., Pa. Vols., Capt. V. A. Elliott. This company has lost, by wounds, disease, &c., all but 35 or 40 men. The Captain who has been absent from the company for some time, on account of ill health, returned to duty last Monday. Lieut. Gaylord has resigned, and is at Mansfield. Lieut. Young is also on account of partial paralysis of the lower limbs.

Capt. Seefeld's company is yet at Camp Curtin, and will probably be there for some time. We paid a short visit to the camp last week, and found the boys of this company, (as well as those of Capt. Phillips, and Hammond's companies,) all uniformed, and in good spirits. Three or four cases of sickness had occurred mainly on account of change of water and diet. They have lots of fun, and manage to pass the time quite pleasantly. It is easy for men to improve means of amusement. A number of men in Seefeld's company got a man into a blanket and tossed him up in the air 20 or 25 feet, to the great amusement of all the others. We saw several volunteers to go up—some went up doubled up, some legs first, and some came down feet foremost. At the same time a prayer meeting was going on in a tent not more than ten rods from the blanket game, and a eulchre party was busy not far from the prayer meeting. Such is camp life. Capt. Seefeld is proud of his men, as, indeed, they are of him. The men from the Tioga companies will not suffer in comparison with any companies in the camp. The boys received their bounty, and sent home the greater part of it.

Companies C, and G, 7th Cavalry. See letter elsewhere. On the 23d of August, Gen. R. W. Johnson of Kentucky, with 800 Union soldiers, comprising a part of the 2d Indiana Regiment, Wynnkoop's Pennsylvania Regiment, and the 5th Kentucky Cavalry, under Col. Haggart, attacked 1,780 guerrillas under Morgan, near Gallatin, and were defeated, with a loss of 300 prisoners, including General Johnson. The remainder of the Union force escaped and went to Nashville, and it is quite probable that some of our boys may have been taken.

Co. L, 2d Regt. Pa. Cavalry, Capt. R. T. Weed, is now with Gen. Banks' Corps. It has been engaged for some time in skirmish duty, and was in the engagement of Cedar Mountain. Captain Thos. B. Bryden's company is now nearly filled. We shall be able to print the roll by next week. We have a ludicrous account of an engagement at Troy last Friday, which occurred while the company was on its way to Harrisburg, but as it reflects no credit upon the valor of the Trojans, we forbear to print it. Captain Bryden is here recruiting and will join his company to-morrow, with a few more men.

MANSFIELD CLASSICAL SEMINARY.

The Fall Term of this Institution will commence Sept. 9th, 1862, and continue thirteenth weeks. Rev. E. WILDMAN, A. M., Principal and Professor of Mathematics and Ancient Languages. Rev. N. L. RETNOLD, A. M., Professor of the Natural Sciences and the Teacher's Department. HIRSH C. JOHNS, A. M., Professor of Penmanship and Normal and Commercial Departments. Mr. L. A. RIDGWAY, Prof. of the German language. Mr. J. W. MORRIS, Assistant in English Department. Mrs. H. P. R. WILDMAN, Preceptress and Teacher of the French language and Belles Lettres.

The Teacher's and Normal Departments, under the supervision of Prof. Reynolds and Johns, will afford all the facilities of a Normal School, in which students are especially drilled and trained to become practical teachers. The trustees have already taken measures, which it is expected will be consummated early in December, for offering and having the Seminary accepted by the State as a State Normal School. The Department of Penmanship, Book-keeping, &c., offer all the advantages of a Commercial College. The Seminary is under contract, to be finished and furnished by the 10th of September next. It will, when finished, be among the best school buildings in Northern Pennsylvania, and will afford excellent facilities for these regions to obtain a thorough scientific and practical education.

Nothing need be said to recommend the Principal to the confidence of the people, as his conduct of the Seminary for the past two years has placed him fully before the public as one of the educators of the country. Prof. Reynolds and Johns—the former, the late Superintendent of common schools of the county—and the latter the present incumbent, are too well and too favorably known to need further notice to recommend them to the public. Students coming from a distance will have their rooms furnished—those from within a few miles will bring their own furniture, except bedstead, table, chairs, wash-stand and stove. All students furnish their own towels, wash-bowls, pitchers, pails, mirrors, &c. Rooms for self-boarded can be had in the village at reasonable rates. If accommodations enough for self-boarded cannot be had in the village, rooms for that purpose, under certain restrictions will be furnished in the Seminary by students furnishing their own stock.
