THE REGULAR SERVICE.—Capt. Borden, of the 14th U. S. Infantry, whose headquarters are over French's Grocery Store, opposite Union Block, is meeting with excellent success in obtaining recruits. Since the 20th inst., he has enlisted nearly fifty men, and a day or two since a squad of 34 men from Mansfield, Pa., reported themselves to him.

NEW MAIL ROUTE.—Congress at its late Session, established a new Mail Route, number 2588. It runs from Tioga, by Bailey Creek, Rutland, and Mansfield (Austinville P. O.), to Columbia Cross Roads, and back, three times a week.

The following notes dated near Cantonville, Va., Sept. 1st, explain the casualties in this company: Dear Sir: As friends at home will want to know how many and who of the Tioga boys were killed and wounded in the fighting of last Friday and Saturday, which took place on the Bull Run battle field, I send you a list of the casualties of this company: L. C. Lewis, wounded, lived one day and died in the hospital; Dan. O'rent, wounded; Michael Evans, wounded; Geo. Dougherty, wounded; Marion Steil, wounded; Seely Rowley, wounded in thigh and a prisoner; N. Ramsey, missing; Richard Sullivan, missing. The wounded are doing well, and most of them have been sent to Washington.
