The Postal Reform bill which passed the House on Saturday, contains an important provision authorizing soldiers in camp and hospital to send and receive letters free of postage.

Gov. CURTIN is reported to be stating that he is concerned that Mr. Thurlow Weed in forming a conservative party in opposition to the emancipation clause of the present.

JOHN CONNOR, a Union or Broderick War Democrat, is elected U. S. Senator from California, in place of Latham, and Connors was elected by Republican votes.

The new style of three cent postage stamps is being issued. They are the same as the old one, but they are printed in a darker color on a dark buff colored paper, and are somewhat like, in color, the five cent postage stamp.

ELECTED AND RE-APPOINTED. - John Platt, Esq., of Williamsport, has been elected Sergeant-at-Arms of the Board of Excise Commissioners, now in session at Harrisburg, and also re-appointed Collector of the West Branch Canal Company at Williamsport.

THE MANUFACTURE OF LINEN. - Companies are being formed in various parts of this State for the manufacture of linen. Many portions of Pennsylvania are well adapted to the raising of flax, and we shall soon see men dressed in "fine linen" instead of coarse cotton, if enterprise takes hold of the advantages with which we are blessed.

NEW RAILROAD ARRANGEMENTS. - We learn that the Elmira, Fredonia and Williamsport Railroad has passed into the hands of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, and that through trains are to be run between Elmira and Fredonia. It is also stated that the Elmira and Fredonia and Pennsylvania Railroad Company have leased the Buffalo, New York and Erie Road, from Corning to Buffalo.

A LETTER RECEIVED from Lieut. Col. Dwight a few weeks since, says that the Pottery Journal, reports the promotion of Col. St. George Brigadier, his commission to date from the 29th of November last. The Regiment numbers 820 men. We hear from other sources that they have been ordered from Washington. After the regiments are brigaded, we presume Lieut. Col. Dwight will be the Colonel of the Regiment.

SMASH UP ON THE WILLIAMSPORT R. R. - The way freight train going South on the Williamsport and Elmira railroad yesterday ran off the track near Troy, and smashed a several cars loaded with produce, butter, eggs, &c. The accident occurred from the slipping out of a car, or from a loose rail. Owing to this the present train from Troy to Elmira at noon did not get started until five o'clock. Nobody hurt.

We see that a general bill has passed the Senate at Harrisburg, and will pass the House, legalizing the payment of bounties last summer by counties and other corporations for the purpose of countering vote-buying. The bill renders perfectly valid, all payments made under contracts or agreements entered into by County Commissioners or other officers on account of such bounties. This will legalize the appropriation made by our County Commissioners.

IMPORTANT TO SCHOOL DIRECTORS. - The attention of School Directors is invited to the following section of the Compulsory School Law passed last winter, in relation to their duties.

That it shall be the duty of the board of Directors in each school district to publish an annual statement of the amount of money received and expended and the amount of the collection, and setting forth all the financial operations of the district in not less than ten printed hand bills, to be put up in the most public places in the district. This notice must be signed by the president of the board and attested by the secretary.

We see in our paper exchanges that Union League Societies are being formed throughout the State, but yet have heard of no movement of the kind in Wellsboro, and we trust that our loyal men will at once proceed to organize. The movement is honorable; it is directed to all secrecy; requires no outlay; and imposes no obligation, but with the support of the Government. If they are once organized the loyal men of Pennsylvania can bid defiance to the copperheads and their agents who are combining in a movement to get power. The butternuts and Tories fear their organization. Let the loyal men of the Borough at once form themselves into a Union League.
