We give this week the proceedings of the Teachers' Institute at Tio, furnished by a special correspondent. Owing to a press of duties we were unable to attend in person, however, we get a better report by proxy than perhaps we could have done. We are glad to learn that the Institute was a success.

The Academy. We like pleasure in stating for the information of the public that the Spring term of the Wellsville Academy opens with a flattering increase in attendance. We learn through its gentlemanly Principal, Prof. Allen, that he has now between 70 and 80 pupils.

Peterson & Brothers, Philadelphia, publish a new card containing the official list of stamp duties under the Internal Revenue law and its amendments, with penalties for violating said law, also exceptions, or cases where no stamp is needed. It will prove invaluable to the business man, giving for the small price of ten cents a vast amount of information, which must otherwise be sought for in a voluminous law. We commend it to everybody.

FOLLY OF HEARING SMALL COIN. Those people who now hoard cents and three cent pieces, do it, probably in the belief that they are much more valuable than the regular paper currency. We suppose they do not intend that cents and three cent pieces are not worth a what they pass for, and that they are not a legal tender for the payment of debts amounting to more than a thirty cents. A person may hoard three cent pieces to the amount of hundreds of dollars, but he cannot pay debts with them or use them at all in business transactions, beyond the amount specified, if he refuses to take them; and who cents these are still worse. Such hoarding is foolish business. These small coins were made to circulate as change, and they were made to pass for more than they are intrinsically worth, in order to keep them in circulation, therefore let them circulate.

A Serious Joke. A friend relates a good anecdote relating to the trials of a batch of rebel prisoners from Camp Douglas, through Elmira, one day last week. While the train was standing on the Williamsport and Elmira track, a copper-headed Irishman approached and began to epaule with his fellow rebels. He assured them that they were fighting in a good cause, added several complimentary flourishes, and wound up with a cheer for Jeff Davis. The officer in charge of the prisoners, very naturally concluding that Pat was one of the prisoners at large, ordered a file of men to arrest him. Patrick protested, struck, kicked and galled, but was finally taken aboard and carried off. When the train approached the first station, thinking the joke had gone for enough, the officer ordered the guard to give Pat an opportunity to escape. This was done, and the rebel took to his heels. His troubles were not ended however; for the officer put two soldiers on his track, and the poor fellow got off badly frightened and wind-broken. Our informant says that Pat turned up in Elmira next day a first-rate Union man.

Those, GENTRY. We hear most encouraging reports from every section of the county in regard to the healthy condition of the industrial interests and the prosperity of all enterprises connected therewith. We are led to believe that Tio is pressing to the van in the march of improvement. Enterprises, backed by labor and capital, is developing her resources and converting them into real wealth. Her coal fields are about to be worked to a greater extent than ever before, her pine forests are disappearing before the axe of the lumberman, and the creation of extensive tanneries has made the hemlock forests, before of nominal value, valuable for their product of bark. Nor is the agricultural interest far behind. As the pine disappears men are turning their attention toward the improvement of their farms, in too many instances before neglected. Farming is not so much subsidiary to lumbering, as it was when we first saw the county. From the incident of the first year, the object, and in the multiplication of the pine, the improvement of fences and the disappearance of the blighty stumps, the record is a progress, as written. There is no good reason why Tio should not become one of the richest in the State. It has great mineral wealth, good water power, and a soil admirably adapted to grain growing. As an encouragement to the erection

of manufacturers, it should be remembered that every factory is the nucleus of a market for the farmer, as it is of employment for the mechanic.
