A word to lawyers - There is a law upon the statute book forbidding the killing of insectivorous birds. It is a good law, founded in humanity and equity.

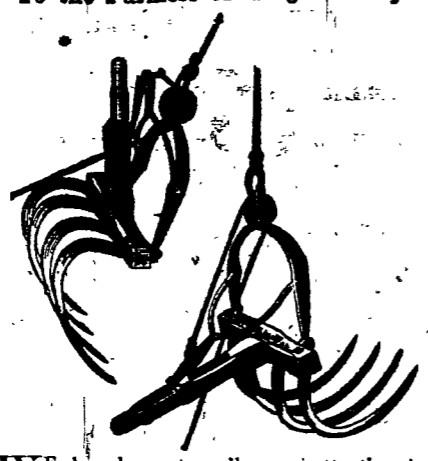
