SMALL PROFITS,

A JOINT RESOLUTION propring certain Amendments to the Contitution. Be it revolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Penneylvania in General Assembly met. That the following amendments be proposed to the Constitution of the Commonwealth, in accordance with the previsions of the tenth article thereof:

There shall be an additional section to the third article of the Constitution, to be designated as section four, as follows:

Section 4. Whenever any of the qualified electors of this Commonwealth shall be in any actual military service, under a requisition from the President of the United States, or by the authority of this Commonwealth, such elections by the citizens, under such regulations as are, or shall be, prescribed by law, as fully as if they were present at their usual place of election.

There shall be two additional sections to the aleventh article of the Constitution, to be designated as sections eight, and nine, as follows:

sections eight, and hine, as follows:

SECTION 8. No bill shall be passed by the Legisle.

ture, containing more than one subject, which shall be clearly expressed in the title, except appropriation

Section 9. No bill shall be passed by the Legislature granting any powers, or privileges, in any case, where the authority to grant such powers, or privileges, has been or may hereafter be, conferred upon the courts of this Commonwealth.
