SOLDIERS' AID SOCIETY.

List of articles in box No. 9, Aug. 24, 1863: 5 jars of pickles, 2 jars of jelly, 3 bottles raspberry vinegar, 2 bottles currant wine, 1 bushel dried apples, 7 rolls of bandages, dried whortleberries, 1 bushel dried currants, 1 dozen eggs, 1 bundle cotton clothes, 4 pairs' woolen socks, quantity of papers, pamphlets, &c.

The Aid Society will pay for blackberries brought to the Court House, Saturday, August 29th, at 2 o'clock, and we would urge the importance of each one trying to contribute, more or less, of these berries to the Aid Society, as there is an urgent demand for them.

The following extracts from the August number of the Society's Reporter, published at Louisville will be read with interest and needed with profit. As will be seen, it conveys a message to our Copperheads as well as to the loyal.

"We request that the circulation be given to Dr. Warriner's appeal to the semi-loyal and those not loyal at all, in behalf of their rebel brethren at Vicksburg. It is not at all probable that this class will send a greater quantity of these articles than can be usually applied to alleviate the suffering or save the lives of those whom the fortunes of war have thrown upon our hands."

"We desire to call the attention of all who wish to contribute to the health, comfort and efficiency of our troops, to the fact that pickles, dried fruit and cranberries are at all times among the most useful articles which can be sent to the army. The latest benefit followed the use of these articles during the winter and spring, and no other articles are so universally and anxiously called for as these. Let every one, then, who has a garden put up pickles and sour cress, and every one who owns an orchard dry up his surplus fruit for our brave defenders. To a soldier threatened with scurvy, or whose digestion has been weakened by camp life, a few pickles or a tin-cup full of dried apples possesses a value scarcely calculable in money."

"The articles just now most needed are old cotton and linen cloths, canned milk, dried fruit, sour cress, ale, green tea, lemons, drawers, shirts, sheets, concentrated beef, canned fruit, pickles, white sugar, potatoes, soda crackers, &c."

BLACKBERRY CAULI.—Take any convenient quantity of blackberries, wash them in a preserving kettle for half an hour; then strain and boil for half an hour, adding one pound of white sugar to each quart of juice; also half an ounce of allspice, and half a pint of good brandy or Monongahela whiskey, then bottle and cork. For a child, a teaspoonful, or more, according to age.

BLACKBERRY WINE.—Gather when ripe, on a dry day. Put into a vessel with the head out, and a tap fixed near the bottom upon which boiling water to cover them. Mash the berries with your hands and let them stand covered till the pulp rises to the top and forms a crust in three or four days.

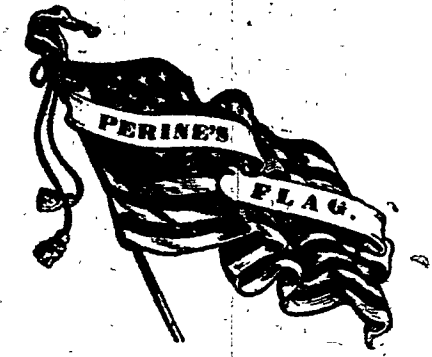

A JOINT RESOLUTION proposing certain Amendments to the Constitution.

Resolved, That the following Amendments be proposed to the Constitution of this Commonwealth, in accordance with the provisions of the tenth article thereof:

Section 1. No bill shall be passed by the Legislature, containing more than one subject, which shall be clearly expressed in the title, except appropriation bills.

Section 2. No bill shall be passed by the Legislature granting any powers, or privileges, in any case, where the authority and such powers, or privileges, has been or may hereafter be, conferred upon the courts of this Commonwealth.

Section 3. No bill shall be passed by the Legislature, containing more than one subject, which shall be clearly expressed in the title, except appropriation bills.

Section 4. Whenever any of the qualified electors of this Commonwealth shall be in any actual military service, under a requisition from the President of the United States, or by the authority of this Commonwealth, such electors may exercise the right of suffrage in all elections by the citizens, under such regulations as are, or shall be, prescribed by law, as fully as if they were present at their usual place of election.

Section 5. No bill shall be passed by the Legislature, containing more than one subject, which shall be clearly expressed in the title, except appropriation bills.

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
