

"To one gallon of water take 14 lbs. of salt, 4 lb. of sugar, 4 oz. of saltpetre: 4 oz. of poineb. In this ratio the pickle te be increased to any quan-tity desired. Let these be boiled together, until all the dirt from the sugar rises to the top and is skimmed off. Then throw it into a tub to cool, and when cold, pour it over your beof or pork, to re-main the usual time, say four or fire weeks. The meat must be well covered with pickle, and should not be put dewn for sat leak two, days after killing,
