Burgess and Town Council of the Berough of Knox-ville, and it is beselv enacted by authority of the same: That any person permitting their Horses, Car-tle, Sheep, or Swine, to run at large in said Borough as stated in the storesaid ordinance shall be liable to the fine therein fixed, whether the same shall be taten up and empounded or not, and it shall be the duty of the Burgers whenever by sight or upon informa-tion farnished, he becomes aware of the violation of the said ordinance, if the animal is not at the time empounded, to proceed to collect for the use of the Borough the fine as aforesaid, as Borough fines are by Inw recoverable, and the of nding animal shall be li-able to be levied upon and sold under an execution

for the fine and costs. SECTION 2. And be il further enacted that if any Burgess shall after being notified of a vielation of the said ordinance, together with the name of the o'ner or owners, and the names of the witnesses, refuse, or

neglect for ten days to perform the duty imposed upon him by this ordinance, he shall be likble to a fine of five dollars to be sued before any Justice of the Peace of the Borough by any citizen thereof, one-half to go into the Borough Treasury, and one half to the prosecutor.
