Graham, who took command of the entire force; and I will bear witness that never have I seen as good marching, and fast, as is daily performed by these sable warriors. Day after day they trudge on, without a straggler; although Fallow its for good reasons, for, as Bennet's seribe has said, "Eull well poor Cuffee knows that if he falls behind his fellows, his hody wiff form an ornament for the highest branch of the nearest tree;" and he jogs on, feeling the force of the time-bor ored maxim-In Union there is strength."

From the Court House we send out scouts in every direction, scouring the country for guerrillis, and succeeded in captuing one captain and ten privates; but luckily for them, they happened to belong to the regular confederate army; for be it known, that we of the 11th cavalry have a peculiar way to dispose of armed citizens; which fact has become publicly known through this portion of Dixie. This county (Mathews) is noted as a rendezvous for large bands of guerrillas, purporting to belong to the confederate navy, who frequently sally forth in boats, from a little bay continonly styled Mob Jack bay, capturing ungrated schooners; and of inte they have become so bold, as to attack our armed transports and tag boats; but strange as it may appear, they remained quietly in their retreats, within the deep swampe, and ventured not forth to disturb our midnight vigils. Here it was that our lads made the terrible example which has made the guerrillas so extremely cautions. A citizen of this county, not having the fear of the Yankees before his eyes, and being incited by an earnest desire to distinguish himself, took his musket at night and sullied forth, against the wishes of his daughter, who rowed that the Yankees would "do him bad," and succeeded in mortally wounding a copporal of Co. I, in this regiment; but the assassin did not escape, but was captured and suspended from a friendly limb, as a warning to his deluded brethren. This seems to have had a healthy effect upon the minds of his fellows, who show themselves but little during our frequent visits, although in dur absence they pledge themselves to "do us mighty sorry."

The burning of the town of King and Queen Court House, by our regiment, in retaliation for the murder and brutal treatment of Colonel Ulric Dablgren, has called down upon us the most bitter anathemas from all Union haters, everywhere; but as yet, the dire calamities invoked, have failed to visit us,

We are now encamped on the Williamsburg battle field, about one mile and a half from the city; and one may see many things to remind him of the terrible struggle where so many of rour brave comrades fell. Directly in front of the lafgest of the robel forts, (Magruder,) in the felled timber; the grace are the thickest, and in many instances of the head-boards are set, telling the names of the core who sleep in the same grave. Officers ful privates lie tuge-ther;—all rank ceases to wist when death comes,—for all are alike a print.

Thousands of our felling s have fallen, and still rebellion is rife in the land; still there may be found, even at the North, men who, at every opportunity, seek to sid and comfort the miscreants who are strateg to tear down our starry banner. 
