There is one test in every community, the true test, is man—one universal rule by which people may know who sells the most goods, and who the freest stock, and who sells the cheapest. It is to send a doubt, the man that advertises, who seeks every means to give his business notice. One man who advertises liberally in the papers, and demonstrate that every dollar he has laid out in advertising has brought him three profits. We will move this to be too low an estimate for him and his advertisers generally. The man who never advertises, never does a very large and very rarely a liberal business. He invariably charges higher for his goods than the man who advertises, because he has fewer customers, and charges higher to the few who do purchase. He is too parsimonious to sell for a good profit. He knows nothing of the profitable mode of trade. He always walks sure of the "slow shilling" when he gets a customer, and charges the profit which the advertiser obtains by the charge. No man is so well known that he has no need of advertising.

PATTERSON PARK HOUSE, Baltimore, Md., April 18, 1864.

Dear Mother—I am once more in the land of civilization, and will write you a few lines. At some other time I will write you the whole history of my imprisonment.

I wrote a number of letters home while at Belle Isle and in the hospital. I have received a word from home since I left last November.

I went to the hospital from Belle Isle on the 22nd of February, sick as a very bad cold, with a cough, sore lungs and breast, and which caused complete loss of appetite. I got over that, and was again with chronic diarrhoea. I also whipped that.

I have been writing in the general hospital at Richmond for about three weeks. After I got that diarrhoea, I got sufficient to eat, and a different kind. If it had not been for that, I should have been dead before now. Out of 283 cases of chronic diarrhoea, in the month of March at that hospital, 105 of them died. I have a complete list of cases, and the names, and the exact number of deaths in each case, for the quarter commencing January 1st and ending March 31, 1864. I smuggled it through with me.

We left Richmond at noon the 15th inst., and got aboard of our boat at City Point at 6 P. M. Arrived here yesterday afternoon.

I would write you a long letter, but I am sick last night, and do not feel well yet. I am pretty well up, and nothing did it but starvation and cold on Belle Isle. I am in hopes I shall be able to have a nurse in my hands soon. If I can't get one, I will volunteer for three years more.

I have been enough to know what the rebels are. I used to think they were human beings, but I have changed my mind. I would like to come home to recruit you. Perhaps I can get a furlough through the influence of Gov. Curtin. Send me your money. I was robbed of my watch, pocket book, overcoat, gun blanket, "cap," haversack, tent, portulac, &c., as soon as I was captured. I'll make it right with the rounds next.

I am not exchanged, and do not know when I shall be. I am the only one of my regiment, and I am too sick to write more. Yours affectionately, JOHN B. EMERY.

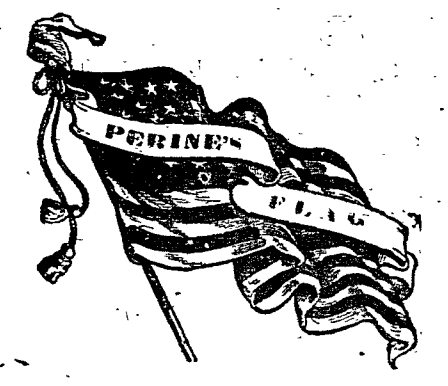
