Mrs. J. W. HAYNES, Secretary. How COMMUNISM EXTERMINATED.—Professor Marshal General Fry, in answer to the inquiry as to the length of time which the payment of Communism in money exempts from liability to service, replies that the language of the law is plain.

The law says: "If any drafted person shall hereafter pay money for the protraction of a substitute, under the provisions of the act to which this is an amendment, such payment of money shall operate only to relieve such persons from draft, filling the quota. If it should be necessary to make several drawings of names in order to fill that quota, that is to say, the quota already assigned, the person paying such payment from all the drawings to fill that quota made subsequent to the one in which he paid commutation."

POISONOUS PARTS OF THE PIE PLANT.—Inasmuch as a vast deal of debate has taken place regarding the chemical properties of rhubarb, or pie plant, and as there are acres of it being cultivated for culinary purposes as well as for wine manufacturing, it may be well to state that the London Gardener's Chronicle cites cases of severe illness being produced by using the swelling buds of this pie plant for tea. Several cases are also mentioned where severe and dangerous illness has resulted from the use of the leaves. The Albany Callator says: "We have known a similar case in this country. Oxalic acid in the leaves may be the cause. Hence caution should be used not to employ any part of this plant as food, except that which experience has proved to be harmless."

UNITED STATES 10-40 BONDS. THESE BONDS are issued under the act of Congress of March 8th, 1864, which provides that all bonds issued under this act shall be EXEMPT FROM TAXATION by or under any State or municipal authority.
