Several cases are also mentioned where severe of dangerous illness has resulted from the use of the fives. The Albany Cultivator says-" We have known a similar case in this country. Oxalic acid in 'the leaves may be the cause. Hence caution should be bed not to employ any part of this plant as food "xcept" that which experience has proved to be harm! is."


