The following is transmitted to Deputy Provost Marshals and Special Agents for their information. CIRCULAR NO. 143 FROM A. P. M. GEE'S OFFICE.

The Secretary of War has ordered that all officers and enlisted men from their respective commands return to the same immediately and all furloughs and passes in effect, except as to Commissioned Officers, absent on sick leave, in orders or by virtue of certificate of disability duly filed, as required by Regulations of the War Department.

All officers and employees of this Bureau are ordered to make special efforts to secure prompt and thorough compliance with the Secretary's orders.

Men who are absent from General Hospital, will be returned to the Hospital from which they were furloughed; all others will be sent by the Provost Marshals to their respective posts, Companies of Regiments, if the same are within convenient reach, if not, they will be sent to nearest General Headquarters to be forwarded there as soon as possible.

The intention is to put every man belonging to the military service on his proper duty, and at his post at once.

Officers of this Bureau will afford every facility for the prompt and convenient return of those complying with the order.

All who make themselves deserters by failing to report will be arrested and returned with charges. Deputy Marshals, will see that the above orders are strictly enforced.

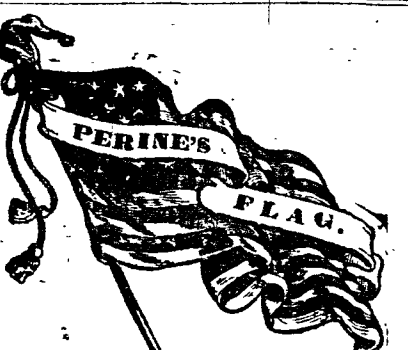
