THE TIoga COUNTY AGITATOR.

IMPORTANT NOTICE.—By the Act of Congress, approved June 30, 1884, and the various acts which relate thereto, it is provided that all persons, residents of the United States whose income exceeds the sum of six hundred dollars per annum, are required to make returns thereof to the Assessor of the District, on or before the first day of May in each and every year.

The year for which the return must be made on or before the first day of May next having just ended, and there is to be given notice to all Merchants, Mechanics, Farmers, Lawyers, Physicians, Miners, Dealers, in short, all persons in the 8th and 10th Divisions of the 18th District of Pennsylvania, having an income taxable to make returns as follows, to wit: Persons residing in the townships of Richmond, Covington, Bloss, Tioga, Sullivan, Ward and Rutland, comprising the 8th Division, will make returns to S. B. ELLIOTT, at his residence in Richmond.

Those residing in the townships of Delmar, Middlebury, Charleston, Chatham, Clymer, Elk, Gaines, Morris, Liberty, Union and Shippen, comprising the 10th Division, will make returns to M. BULLARD, at his office in Wellsboro, on or before the 1st day of May next of their annual gains, profits or incomes from any and all sources, or we shall be compelled to make such returns for all who neglect or refuse as in our judgment may seem just, and compute the tax and add fifty per cent. thereto.

In estimating an income no person is allowed to deduct from his return receipts for year any expenses incurred in support of himself or family, his own wages or salary of his wife and minor children, or any outlay for land, new buildings, carriages, horses, cattle or implements of furniture of any kind, except to replace such implements as have been worn out.

Every laboring man who has received for his services and labor, and from all other sources, over six hundred dollars during the year '84, should make return.

Every mechanic whose receipts for the year 1884, exceed six hundred dollars after deducting the legitimate expenses of carrying on his business, not deducting his own or minor children's labor, and from all other sources should make return.

Every farmer, the value of whose farm produce of all descriptions, such as wheat, corn, hay, straw, wool, butter, meat, vegetables &c., without deducting anything for the labor of himself or family or for any portion of produce consumed by himself or family, exceeds the sum of six hundred dollars, should make return.

All receipts from any source, such as rents, salaries and interest on notes and judgments, must be included.

An itemized account should be made out under oath beginning with the first day of January 1884, and ending on the thirty-first day of December of said year, both days inclusive.

This notice is not required by law, but is given for the benefit of those liable to an income tax, and fair warning is given that if persons liable do not come forward and make their returns by the time required by law, that we shall do our duty as officers to the best of our ability.

All necessary blanks and information can be had at any time on application to either of us. The tax is upon the excess of six hundred dollars. There are also certain proper deductions to be made from an income which are pointed out in the blanks and accompanying instructions.
