MORE REMOVS ABOUT THE FRANCE REBELS. IRON-CLADS.—M. Johnson, our consul at Halifax, has forwarded to the Government at Washington some interesting statements in regard to one of the iron rams constructed in France, and said to have fallen into the hands of the rebels. The consul says he has information that this ram is now at one of the West India islands, preparing for a cruise. He has information, also, to the effect that some rebel steamers have guns and supplies, and are waiting there. The old rumor that these vessels are coming to this port is repeated. Mr. Johnson expresses no confidence in the correctness of this information; neither does he discredit it; but gives it on authority upon which he seems to rely.
