Monuments costing \$300 would be but a poor offer-ing of tribute to the dead, and would in future only be re-garded as monuments of narrowmindedness and ingratitude. And wen should we place such monuments in all the three-cornersed lots of the classes of the county, it would ou-by prove our shortcomings in this age to do justice to the deceased, while a united effort might raise a monument worthy of the cause. Relative to the location of the Monument to be erected.
