Fire—Fire was discovered in the dwelling occupied by Mrs. Stevens, Milliner, on Main Street, at about 8 o'clock Saturday evening, and so far advanced as to render fruitless all efforts to save it. There was a goodly crowd on the ground in a few minutes, and all hands were turned to the work of saving the dwellings of Judge Williston and Mr. Rich's on either side. Fortunately, we may say providentially, the night was not windy, and the atmosphere, surcharged with driving wind, or, in the absence of anything like a supply of water for the engine, and neither house could have escaped serious damage. The engine was on the ground in season, and while the water lasted, did good service. As it was, it saved Mr. Rich's house and greatly aided in saving that of Judge Williston. But everybody saw that the buildings were well—we may say heroically, and when all did so well it would be invidious to mention any one in particular.

The fire was kindled by an incendiary without doubt. There had been no fire in the building for weeks, as we are informed. The affair should be thoroughly investigated, and when the guilty one is found, "let the law do its duty." The act of setting fire to a dwelling so located as to endanger inhabited dwellings on either hand, is worthy of capital punishment.

This fire ought to teach us all that—Wellsboro needs several large wells, or reservoirs along Main street.

Wellsboro needs to encourage its Fire Company to more efficient organization.

Wellsboro should have a man of sense at its head, and quick judgment, for Chief Engineer of the Fire

Department. Put your best man into that place. If you have not got a "best man," import one. And finally—people should never go to work to get houses of their furniture, until the loss of the house is paid doubt. Had the people who carried furniture out Saturday evening, taken pains, and carried water, there could have been no danger whatever to any of the new dwellings.

Remember this: A tall house does not fire a low one easily; for the heat rises, and goes over the low one. But a low house easily sets a tall one on fire, for the same reason.

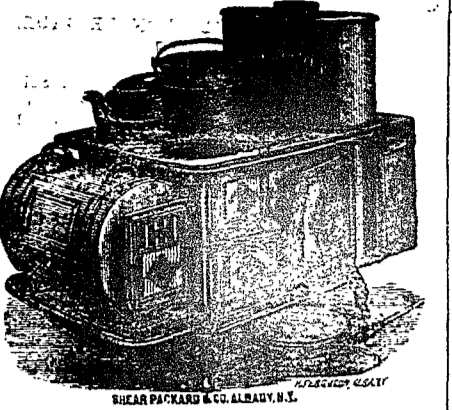
