THE OIL HUNTERS .- Probably the biggor week's work yet done in this County in boring for goil was done by Mr. J. Schieffelin, the Superintendent of "Jacob's well," last week. The depth made was 115 feet, through compact slate and thin veins of shale and quartz. The bitt reached a salt water fissure on Wednesday last at a depth of 160 feet. The water makes very fine white suit. At 198 feet the hitt struck a stratum of sandstone which proves to be of very considerable thickness. The developments at this well show that we are a hundred feet nearer the sand rock than at Tings. This well is down 225 feet. The boring at Knoxville has been suspended for

the present. The Westfield well is down upward of 100 feet and

slowly progressing. The Oceola Well is down upward of 500 fect, and the bitt is in another stratum of oil-bearing lock it is said.

The "Lucky Well" is down 850 feet. Mr. Murray is pumping his Farmington weil at 675 feet-having drawn the tubing.
