A NEW WAY OF TRAPPING RATS.—Get a common round wire trap. Bait it with the most inviting food, and wait patiently until a rat is caught.

FACTS IN FRUIT CULTURE.—Doctor Trimble, of Newark, N. J., who has paid great attention to fruit culture gives the following as his views, the result of many years experience:

- 1. That the most successful way to conquer the curculio is to gather the fruit as it falls and feed it to the stock or destroy it, as it is by this fallen fruit that the curculio propagates its species.

HITCHING POSTRY.—The following lines should be pondered by every one who presumes to hitch his horses to our village shade trees.

HOW TO BUILD A CHIMNEY.—In building a chimney put a quantity of salt into the mortar with which the intercourse of bricks are to be laid.

A correspondent writes to the Philadelphia Ledger, that six years experience have convinced him that a coat of gum copal varnish, applied to the soles of boots and shoes, and repeated as it dries, until the pores are filled, and the surface shines like polished mahogany, will make the soles waterproof, and also cause them to last three times as long as ordinary soles.

HOW TO KILL CANADA THISTLES.—Mow them in August, when the sign is in the heart and it is said in the old of the moon. I have tried the experiment, and the first year it killed more than half and the second year there was very few left, and the third year there was not one to be found.

PRESERVING POTATOES.—Put a foot of potatoes in a bin, then sprinkle with slacked lime then another layer of potatoes, then lime till completed. A bushel of lime will suffice 50 bushels of potatoes.—Rural American.
