A small box, with a drawer lid, with the bottom knocked out, is inverted, and a coarse plece of wire gauze placed inside, over the lid, which now forms the bottom. This seive is then covered with a layer of the prepared sand. The flowers, properly thinned, are then placed on this sand, and completely imbedded in more of it, to keep them in position The box, covered with paper, is then placed in a room or oven, in waich a temperature of 100 to 110 degrees Fahrenheit, in which they will soon be dried. Then the lid of the box is drawn, which causes the sand to fall out, eaving the dried flowers on the gauze .-Should the flowers have faded, they are touched up with paint afterwards."

Hogs in Orchards .- A correspondent o the Richmond (Va.) Farmer says: "Several years ago we had a fine young orchard which never bore at all for six or seven years. We supposed frost was the cause of their not bearing. At last it was convenient to fatten our hogs in the peach orchard, about six The MORNING TRAIN from New York conborne abundantly, every year except last year, when the frost killed the fruit. The cause of the barrenness was the flat white worms eating into the roots of the treesthese the hogs rooted out and destroyed."

Saving Cabbages .- Select n dry rart of the garden- dig trenches of sufficient depth to receive the root and stocks up to the head-into these trenches transplant the cabbages, heads up of course, fill in the dirt carefully about them up to the heads, plant four posts, two of them being higher than the others to risbu give a pitch to the roof nail shingling lath, or strips of old boards from one post to the other. and another board half way up, lay upon this a number of bean poles, and upon these throw straw, cornfodder, protecting also the sides, and your cabbages, will keep in good condition until May.

Where there is a fence, only two posts will be necessary, that being employed as the apex of the cover or roof.

QUALITIES OF CATTLE .- Ayrshires for cheese, Devons for butter, and Alderneys for cream. These, on the best native stock will improve. The improved Shorthorns combine these qualities to a large extent, and are besides, superior for beef. When we say the Alderneys, for cream, we mean the richest cream, not the most, as less milk is given by them than by the Devons, and less butter made from a cow. For the farmer who has but few cows, the improved Shorthorns are the best, as they combine more the good qualities. Excellent for milk, they are still more so for beef .- Rural World.

. To PRESERVE CRAB APPLES .- Take off the stem and score them with a pen-knife, without cutting them open. Weigh a pound of white sugar for each pound of prepared fruit: Leave New York at 6.30 A. M. and 12. M. put it over a moderate fire. When the sugar "Philadelphia at 7.45 A. M. and 1.30 P. M. put it over a moderate fire. When the sugar is all dissolved and hot, put the apples in : let | Arrive at Wilkesbarre at 3.02 and 8.48 P. M. skim them out and place them in flat dishes. Boil the syrup until it is thick; put the fruit in whatever it is to be kept, and when the Wm. O. GARDNER & CO syrup is cooled and settled, pour it carefully bave just received a large and a splendid stock over the fruit. Slices of lemon boiled with goods consisting of the fruit may be considered an improvement, one lemon is enough for several pounds fruit. Crab apples may be preserved whole with only half an inch of the stem, threequarters of a pound of sugar for each pound CLOTHING. of fruit.

To GET RID OF FIES .- When the flies settle on the cealing, as they usually do at night reduce the light in the room so you can just see them, and take a tumbler, or wider vess sal, two thirds full of warm soap suds, and place it quickly over each group of flies, when they will fall into the suds. With a chair or Cloths, form to stand upon you can soon clear a whole room, entirely destroying the pests .-I have caught a pint of them thus in a very Cassimeres, few minutes.

ROSEMARY WASH FOR THE HAIR .- Boil one pound of rosemary in two quarts of water, filter it and add one ounce of spirits of lovender, and a quarter of an ounce of Naples soap, salt of tarter, or borax.

To DESTROY WARTS .- Dissolve as much washing soda as the water will take up, keep it in a bottle, and touch the warts two or three times a day with a feather dipped in the solution, allowing it to dry on them; or apply lemon juice frequently during the day for a week or two.

GINGER JUMBLES .- Take one cup of but ter, two cups of sugar, one cup of molasses, one cup of cream, one teaspoonful of saleratus one tablespoonful of ginger, two eggs, and a glass of wine; flour sufficient to roll them

WAFERS .- Take seven eggs, one half pound of butter, one pound of sugar, one half pound of currants, enough flour to make as stiff as pound cake.

TOMATO WINE .- Take small ripe tomatoes pick off the stem, put them in a basket or tub, wash clean, then mash well and strain through a linen rag, (a bushel will make five gallons pure); then add two and a half to three pounds of good brown sugar to each gallon, then put it into a cask, and let it ferment as for raspberry wine. If two gallons of water be added to each bushel of tomatoes, the wine will be as good,


