

Farm Garden & Kitchen.

It is poor practice for a farmer to dig and delve, tug and grub, and clear up fifty acres of land at a cost of \$2,000 and then in the third year surrender about a fifth of it to the briars, brambles and six eye daisies.

Poor practice to half-mow, half plow, half seed and half cultivate a field, and then harvest from it less than half a crop.

Hard cider will turn to vinegar very soon by exposing it to the atmosphere in a warm place. Allowing it to run slowly from an inverted into another over a platform covered with oak shavings will hasten the process.

When hens pick the feathers off each other round the necks, so as to make them bare, it is because they need something in their food as animal matter. They may be seen picking at the ends of the feathers, thus plucked, from which some substance is extracted.

BAKED HAM—Most persons boil hams. They are much better baked if baked right, soaked for an hour in clean water and wiped dry, and then spread all over with a thin flour battery and lay in a deep dish with slices under it to keep it out of the gravy.

The following hints to Young Farmers we clip from an exchange, and fully endorse the sentiment: Consider your calling the most elevated, and the most important; but never be above it, nor be afraid of the frock and the apron.

Put off no business which ought and can be done to-day, until tomorrow. As soon as the spring opens and the frost is out of the ground, put your fences in order.

Plant no more ground than you can well manure, and cultivate to advantage. Never hire a man to do a piece of work which you can do yourself.

Keep no more stock than you can keep in good order, and that of the best kind. Keep out of debt and avoid the Sheriff.

Plant fruit trees with the expectation of having fruit, without giving the trees half the attention required to make them profitable. Practicing economy by depriving stock of proper shelter during the winter, and feeding them unsound food, such as half rotten and mouldy hay or fodder.

KEEPING AN INNUMERABLE TRIBE OF RATS ON THE PREMISES, AND TWO OR THREE BIG LAZY DOGS, WHO NEVER Molest the vermin. Spending wretched days in groceries and bar-rooms, instead of being at home putting things together when you have leisure.

TAKE THE TOMATOES (the small red one are preferable) wash but not skin them, and thoroughly boil one hour, and then put them through a hair sieve, and to one quart of juice add one table spoonful of cinnamon, one table spoonful of black pepper, half of cayenne half of nutmeg, one of good mustard, two thirds of a teaspoonful of salt. Boil three hours, and then to one quart of juice add one pint of pure cider vinegar. Boil half an hour longer; bottle hot and seal up. This can be used for years, and not require shaking before using. A porcelain kettle should be used.

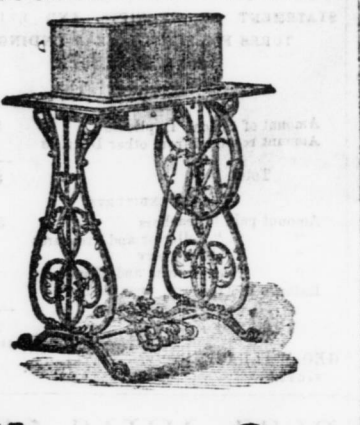
