

Farm Garden & Kitchen.

Mr. A. P. Davis of Lake Washington, Minn., by selecting the earliest ears of corn for several successive years, has a variety of white dent corn, which he says will always escape the fall frosts, if properly cultivated.

GATHERINGS.

Three brothers in Plymouth, Mass., own a cranberry meadow of fifty acres, from sixteen of which they picked last year 1,950 bushels. They intend to devote the remainder of the land to the same crop, and in good years expect to harvest 6,000 bushels.

If sheep are kept in the same lot with cows or fat cattle, no dog will disturb them. As soon as the dogs approach the sheep, they run to the cattle who drive off the dogs.

The influence of food on the quality of milk is very striking. A half starved cow not only yields but little milk, but what it yields is miserably poor.

The Gardener's Monthly advises that in tying up climbers to wire or other kinds of trellis or lattice-work, they should never be allowed to twist themselves in and about the meshes, as it is often necessary to take off the plant to paint or repair the trellis.

The carrot is the most esteemed of all roots for its feeding qualities, and its influence on the stomach upon the other articles of food is most favorable, conducing to the most perfect digestion and assimilation.

KEEPING FARM ACCOUNTS.

Let any farmer make the experiment, and he will find it as interesting and useful to know from year to year the actual produce of his farm. Let everything therefore, that can be weighed or measured; and let that which cannot be brought to a correct standard, be estimated as if he himself were about to sell or purchase it.

The labor in doing this is nothing compared with the satisfaction of having done it, and the benefits which must arise from it. Conjecture in these cases is perfectly wild and uncertain, varying often, with different individuals, almost a hundred per cent.

SEEDS.—Get a complete assortment for next year. Much of the success of farming depends upon this item. For corn select sound ears and those growing two upon a stalk. Keep the ears in a warm dry room, until thoroughly dried.

DWARF PEAR TREES.—Young dwarfs are often seriously injured when planted in exposed places where winds sweep of the snow. Much good may be done in such instances by covering the ground early in winter with manure spread three or four inches in thickness, and in circles from five to eight in diameter around the trees.
