The Liability Act. The following act, which is of importance to railroad companies and the public generally, was approved by the Governor on the 4th inst:

Section 2. That in all actions now or hereafter instituted against common carriers or companies owning, operating, or using a railroad as a public highway...

Section 3. That it shall be lawful for such carrier or corporation to insure the lives and persons of passengers against loss or injury from accidental causes...

Section 4. That all acts or parts of acts inconsistent herewith and the same are hereby repealed, and any provisions in the acts incorporating such common carriers or corporations inconsistent herewith shall be repealed...
