#### MONTHLY HINTS.

This is a month of fruit gathering as well as that of root. The pushing forward as fast as possible the corn-husbing, the proper storing of the fodder. In many places it will be much needed this winter. Make all recied repairs of farm buildings. This is a fe corable time to paint any buildings that

In selecting your seed corn select the finest ears and trace together and hang up to dry; it is better done now than in the spring, in the crib, and is sureer to grow. A stout wire stretched in the garret of the house or other loft, is one of the best things to hang seed corn on, as it can be easily arranged so as to keep of rats and mice.

Commence feeding the hogs; give cooked food, one bushel of cooked food makes more pork than twice that amount fed raw. Hogs will fatten faster this month than in any other.

Do not attempt to fatten more cattle than you can fully supply with food, or they will not afterwards flourish well even if fully supplied. Young cattle cannot be brought up in flesh at an outlay

which will pay, if neglected early.

Late plowing is beneficial to clay soil intended for tillage next season Leave without harrowing, thus giving a greater surface for the frost to act

Harvest your potatoes if not already done ; mar-

Put your roads in good repair before the fall rains

spring. Get your trees from reliable nurserymen, some of whom are advertising in the papers. Feed the pumpkins to the milch cowe and fattening

Make compost industriously; use those made in helow. August on your clayey lands, ridging and back furrowing them, running the subscil plow in the bottom of the open furrows By this system the manures will occupy the centro of the ridges, and thus their gasses during the de composition will be absorbed, instead of passing off in the atmosphere. The subgasses during the de composition will be absorbed, soiling between ridges will prevent the ridges from compacting by rains, and the subsoil will be readered fit for sustaining plants another year from receivthe atmosphere and the carbonic acid and ammonia carried in by the rains. The frequent freezings and thawings during winter, will render ridges pervulent by spring, and suitable for early culture. Do not plow sandy lands in the fall.
