Accidental Shooting.

Mr. Asier Stemples, who resides a short distance from town, while out on a fox hunt, on Saturday last, received a severe and dangerous wound from the accidental discharge of his own gun. He had set it down, and in taking it up grazed the muzzle, drawing it towards him, when the hammer was caught and raised up by a twig, and discharged it into his cheek; the bones of which were broken into fragments, tearing and mutilating the face and side of head in a terrible manner. His brother who was with him took him to the house of Miles Avery, near which the accident occurred, when several surgeons were called. After taking out the fragments of bone—seven or eight in number—and dressing the wound, they were of the opinion that if inflation of the eye and brain can be kept down, he will recover.

The River Bridge, which was progressing merrily, will be delayed ten days or more, by the late freshet in the river. The false-works or truss, which were under the second spans were carried away, though most of the timber was afterwards secured.

The small Borough bridge at the lower end of town is now so far finished as to be used for crossing.

The side railing and the guard or wing walls will shortly be put up. When finished, that heretofore dangerous highway leading to the town will be very secure. Guard walls should be extended from the end of the County bridge across the main creek to render that crossing entirely safe. One or two quite serious accidents have happened at that point, for want of something of the kind.
