

Drowned,--Patrick Manyon, who for sever months past has been working for H. B. Morgan, or the R. R. at this place and at Meshoppen, wa drowned in the pool of the Horse-race dam, near Me hoopany, on Tuesday of last week.

Patrick, who with a friend named James Riley had put themselves outside of rather too much "fu sil oil,"-commonly called whiskey,-to be any way at all cautious, started from the dam, to Mehoopany across the ice. When nearly across the river, they walked straight into an opening or air-hole, and of course went down, clinging desperately to each other. They struggled and arose to the surface two or three times, until persons who saw their danger had come to their assistance. Riley was rescued in a senseless and strangled condition, and after proper restora, tives was revived. Manyon though still struggling when assistance came, had sunk in the water unde the ice, so that is was impossible to reach him ex-cept by a hook and pole. The body was brought out after it had been in the water for an hour or up wards ; but too late for resuscitation.

His remains were taken to his friends in Pittston or Scranton. He had in his pockets about \$70 in money saved from several months of industry and obriety. Those who have known him here, during the past few months, speak of him as an honcrable, industrious and,-up to this fatal spree-a temperate

The more Silver put on the goods, the chapper it is done in properties to the amount of Sciences at S in proportion to the amount of Silver used. THE ONLY LADY'S BOOK IN AMERICA

THE

Lines written by "J. W. S." have been read and found somewhat defective in their orthographical. syntaxical, and prosodical arrangement. We are certainly doing the writer a favor in declining to print them in their present shape. While the ideas of the writer seem to be very correct, he fails to en-press them correctly, in rhymes. We think it can be set down as an indisputa. ble proposition that no person ever wrote good rhymes, to say nothing of poetry-who had not previously learned to express his thoughts correctly and ntelligently in prose.

A knowledge of the rules of grammar-and not or ly this, but, the ability to apply them, is necessary to insure correctness in either prose or poetry. Many very entertaining writers, however, are found in fault when tried by the strict rules of grammar out their errors are mually such, as are only detect ed, by very critical eyes-not glaring defects, or violations of the simplest principles of our language. Mistakes in this respect, are far less likely occur in prose, than in poetry or rhyme. To write prose requires only the putting on paper of our houghts, in our every-day language. In writing rhymes, the inexperienced writer often finds himself, or is found, floundering about in a grammatical tangle, brought about in his efforts to produce a jingle of words at the end of his lines, which he often, fond ly imagines, turns his thoughts into poetry.

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
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
