CABBAGE JELLY .- Boil Cabbage in the usual way and aqueeze it in a colander till perfectly dry; then chop small, add a little butter, pepper and salt; press the whole very closely into an earthenware mould. and bake on hour either in a side oven or in front of the fire. When done turn it out,

THE WELL SWEEP .- The editor of the Agriculturist, discussing the various kinds of patent windlasses and curbs for wells comes back to the old-fashioned well sweep as the simplest, most durable, easiest, and by far the best method of drawing water from wells not over twenty or twenty-five feet deep. "The old oaken bucket," hung on a sweep, has some advantages, certainly beyond those of association and poetry.

INDIAN SLAPPERS .-- Take a quart of three pints of sifted meal, a piece of lard as big as a turkey's egg; pour a tea-cup full of boiling water over them, add a big spoonful of salt, three or for eggs previous ly beaten, mix enough to thin them about like muffin batter; grease the griddle wel pour on two or three large spoonfuls; when brown, turn. Serve them hot. It is a delightful bread.

Burns .- An exchange says" that nothing on the face of the earth equals cool water as a remedy for Burns. "The burned portionshould be soaked several hours in water persons whose hands have been severely burned have experienced such a relief by placing them in a basin of water at the bed side that they could sleep comfortably all night and wake and find themselves almost as well as ever. The remedy is very simple and easly tried.

To PREVENT RUST ON PLOWS .- A cor respondent of the Rural World, gives the following which he says he tried successfully. It is simple and worth adopting None but the plowman know the adva-tage of having a bright plow. The write has tried a great many articles to prevent plows and other agricultural implement from rusting. There is nothing so good and handy as patent axle grease. I have used tallow, paint, and Japan varnish, but the axle grease is always convenient and easily applied.

CURING HENS OF SETTING. - We have lately seen (we forget where) an easy and rational cure. It is simply to put under the hen a few eggs just about ready to back or put one or two young chickens underate the uight time; take her off and put her in a box with the young chicks a few hours then take the chicks away from her and turn her out, and, in a majority of case she will, after clucking for a day or two commence laying again, feeling, in her ow mind, well assured that she has fulfille the maternal instinct.

LARD .-- The lard should be taken of the inwards as soon as taken out and seaked two or three days in spring water, changing it twice a day, then fried in an iron kettle and kept for winter use. The lea should be cut up in small pieces and fried nicely, and when a little cool strain into tin pans; when cooled to the consistency of honey turn it into a fat tub or a stone jar, cover tight, and set it in the store-room If for summer use, when the weather becomes worm set the tub or jar on a table or shelf in the cellar, three or four feet from the bottom. In this way we keep lard the year round without salt or even trying once in the spring.

A MIXED HUSBANDRY .-- AD exchange in disquisition on farming policy says: it will be seen that we must now lay our plans for a mixed husbandrythat is the products of the field, the or chard and the garden. Not only these, but there is another small stem or two that should not be overlooked. the railroads will need ties and timber for track purposes, and this will make a new demand on us, it is true that this is a crop not maturing in one year, but it is nevertheless crop that we must plant and wait patiently for the harvesting. Our old forests will soon be stripped of timber for this purpose. and the new supply must come from the farms; we must, therefore, begin at once to, supply this new demand.

LEAKS OF THE FARM .- To feed publins of corn or dry ground feed to cattle; be cause it is not properly chewed, as intended by Nature, and as is necessary to be entirely digested.

To feed cattle in stacks, because they

waste more than they eat. To allow cattle to roam at will all over the country or the farm; because they trample and injure valuable grassland or graincrops. Keep them at home, soil them, and have warm stables; you will save food and economize feed.

To allow hay to lie late in the evening. It is better to neglect your corn to secure

your hay early.

To burn valuable timber for fuel, at pres-

ent prices of timber. To let untullied land lie waste and un used when it would be quit easy to devote HEAVY AND LIGHT WAGONS, it to the production of trees for the purpose of building. The wood-fuel any farmer uses each winter would be worth in money sufficient to purchase coal for two years.

To let cattle out of the stable on cold days after eating dry feed and be sept off to fill themselves with ice water and get a chill, or stand huddled up in some fence corner the greater part of the day.

To cultivate any more land than can be thoroughly taken care of and well manur-


