LICE ON CATTLE.

Very few farmers have an idea of the immense cost of wintering lice.

A lousy animal will consume about one-fourth more food than one of the same size which is free from them, will lose flesh continually: hence no stock-keeper can afford to ellow his animals to be lousy, particularly as the remedy, a certain one, is so simple

infeated with lice, apply the remedy at once to the whole herd, for one lousy animal medy is simply this: Apply dry wood-The most convenient mode of application known to the writer is, to attach a light wooden hoop-seive, about eighteen inches in diameter and four inches in derth, with wirecloth bottom, with meshes about an eight of an inch, to the end of a light, tough le, say ten feet in length, and with apply the ashes by sifting over the animal his entire length.

Two or three quarts is sufficient for one application on a large animal.

I have found the remedy most active and efficient when I applied it as soon after the animals were thoroughly dry, after a rain that the sahes may not be washed off by seis for several days after it is applied; but four or five days after an applic it is desirable to expose the animal to a drenebing warm rain. As soon as the hair is dry, apply again and treat as before. A third application is generally sufficient, and I have never known the fourth to fail. Four to six days should intervene the applications, as the nits batch in from ave to eight days, according to the po-

eition they accupy on the animal.
