ENCOURAGEMENT FOR LOYAL WOMEN.—Letters from soldiers in the field say nothing heretofore has inspired them with so much enthusiasm and courage as the pledge of northern women, in recent meetings in the various States, to make common cause with them, and care for their dear ones at home.

THE PATRIOTIC LADIES in State street below Third, have flung to the breeze from a rope running across that magnificent thoroughfare a beautiful national flag. It is in preparation for the reception of the Dauphin County Regiment.
