Additional News From Rebel Sources. MEMPHIS, May 17.

The Chattanooga Rebel of the 16th contains the following: "The retaliation resolutions accepted by Congress, provide that a commissioned officer who shall commit a gross crime for military service against the Confederate States, or aid them in any military enterprise, shall, if captured, be put to death; the negroes when captured to be turned over to the State authorities to be dealt with according to the present or future laws of the State.

"The finishing shops of the Tridagar Iron Works and Casshaw's wooden factory, in Richmond, were destroyed by fire on the 15th inst. "The rebel General F. J. Churchill, and command, captured at Arkansas Fort, and lately captured, are reported to be on their way to John Joe Johnston.

"Bragg's headquarters have been removed to Shelbyville.

"The Rebel contains a mournful editorial over the Bragg and Breckinridge difficulty. "The Rebel of the 13th inst., says that the 1st of General Jackson is 'not to be lamented than a dozen such victims are to be wanted. The question now is of weight and endurance, and every fruit of victory is a defeat. General Lee's moral battles must be discontinued."

Capture of Jackson, Miss.

CINCINNATI, May 18. The Chattanooga Rebel of May 16th, has been received at Harrisburg. It contains a dispatch dated May 14th, which says: "Jackson is captured by the enemy. We fought them all day, but could not hold the city."

[This above dispatch is undoubtedly correct. General Grant we know had whipped the rebels at Raymond on the 12th, and on the 13th the Richmond papers said "the firing was very heavy towards Jackson." The city was probably taken that day, and the news was received in Mobile the next morning, which is the date of the dispatch to the Rebel.]
