OUR PUBLIC SCHOOLS.—Through the kindness of the city School Directors, we have the pleasure of laying before our readers, this afternoon, a correct catalogue of the officers, teachers and others connected with our public schools in this city.

The schools of the city are separated into two distinct districts. The first school district includes the First and Second wards of the city proper.

Walnut Street Female School—Teachers, Miss A. Y. Woodward, (No. 1.) Miss Matilda Benjamin, (No. 2.) Miss Jane Mowry, (No. 3.) Miss C. S. Hertzell, (No. 4.)

Music and Drawing Teacher—visiting all the female schools.—Miss Susan F. Alexander.

There is no German teacher connected with this district, at present, but Mr. Hegmann commences teaching this useful language the 1st of June.

At the Walnut Street school house, the directors have a fine, large telescope, and apparatus and diagrams for the use of pupils studying chemistry, philosophy and physiology.

Orders for admission to the schools in the district are procured from the Secretary's office in Walnut street, near Front, only on Monday morning, and before school hours.

There are three other female schools in this ward, situated in Chestnut street—the first two between Third and Fourth streets, and the third in the meeting room of the Washington Hose House.

This building has recently been turned over to the directors again, who are having it refitted, in order to re-open the school, and to replace the scholars in their old familiar quarters.

The colored school, taught by John Wolf, (colored), is in Cherry alley, between Third and Fourth streets, and the number of scholars is gradually increasing.

The schools have but a small and limited supply of philosophical apparatus, though well supplied with geographical maps and physiological diagrams.

Orders for admission into the schools of this ward are given at any time by applying at the office of the Secretary, in his clothing store, Market, between Third and Fourth streets.

The school hours, until the 1st of June, commence at 8 1/2 o'clock, and the scholars are dismissed at 12. Afternoon hours are from 2 o'clock until 5, with the exception of the primary classes, which are dismissed at 4 1/2 o'clock.

Monthly reports are furnished to the Secretary of the School Board from this institute, and when a teacher is absent two consecutive weeks, instant dismissal is the result, unless a reasonable excuse is given for such absence.

But the most interesting feature by which the schools are connected in the consolidation of the two boards, is the fact that in the spring of 1862, when an election was held, this board and a board of controllers formed a committee to elect the teachers of all the public schools, the city, and appoints committees on a series of studies, by which the parents of the scholars will be saved the inconvenience and expense of purchasing new books when they change their places of residence.
