TOWN AND COUNTRY.

THE COMMITTEE OF ARRANGEMENTS OF THE BANQUET OF THE CITIZEN FIRE COMPANY will meet at the engine house this (Friday) evening.

RESUMING OPERATIONS.—The Cameron furnace, Middletown, rendered inoperative by the breaking out of the present war, is being prepared to resume operations, and will probably be started the coming week.

THE SUQUEHANNA is now but one foot above low water mark, and gradually falling. If we are not blessed with an abundance of rain soon, the river will be below its proper level.

CORNER STONE LAYING.—The corner stone of the Second Lutheran church, near the corner of Forster's avenue and Ridge road, will be laid this afternoon at four o'clock.

CAMP CURTIN.—Although it is intended that several nine months' regiments, still in service, shall be quartered in Camp Curtin until mustered out, scarcely five hundred men can be found there at any time during the day.

MONTHS HOME.—The 184th Pennsylvania nine months' regiment commanded by Col. Franklin B. Speckman, and numbering six hundred and fifty men, returned home last evening.

IMPORTANT TO JUSTICES OF THE PEACE.—By the list of stamp duties imposed by the amended act, all transcripts of judgments from dockets of justices of the peace, will require a five cent stamp attached, which it will be the duty of the justice to cancel.

PAYING OFF THE SOLDIERS.—The payment of the nine months' men will soon be completed, and transportation given them to their homes. It is pity that some of them spend their money so recklessly, though discharged soldiers, in general, when they have their accounts settled with the Government, are neither reckless nor indulgent, but invest their money where it will be of service hereafter.
