TOWN AND COUNTRY.

A LOT OF FINE STRAWBERRIES are selling cheap at John Wise's, Third and Walnut.

HAIL.—There has been hail on several occasions in different parts of the country, but so far no injury has been done to the crop.

THE CROPS.—Gentlemen who have recently visited Lebanon, Berks, Lehigh and Northampton counties state that the crops look exceedingly well in those localities, and from present indications an abundant harvest may be anticipated.

AN ITEM FOR SPORTSMEN.—Sportsmen should bear in mind that there is a law on the statute book of this Commonwealth forbidding the shooting, under penalty of a fine and imprisonment for an infraction thereof, of a nightingale, nighthawk, blue bird, yellow bird, oriole, finch, shrub, lark, sparrow, wren, martin, swallow, wood-pecker or any other harmless bird, at any time, and bob-link and robin between the first of February and the first of October.

STRAWBERRIES were plenty in market this morning, and prices dropped to a somewhat reasonable figure. The market opened with the price of this fruit at twenty-five cents a box, but before the market closed the vendors were glad to take fifteen cents per box.
