QUARTERED IN THE COURT HOUSE.—The members comprising the Keystone Artillery battery, from Philadelphia, who arrived here yesterday, were removed from Camp Curtin last evening, and now occupy the Court room, in the Court House. The battery numbers 145 men and four commissioned officers.

MEALS OF HONOR.—The Adjutant General has been ordered by the Secretary of War to provide appropriate medals of honor for the troops who, after the expiration of their terms, have offered their services to the Government in the present emergency. Also, to volunteers from other States who have volunteered to go to the relief of Pennsylvania and Maryland.

NEW COUNTERFEIT.—A counterfeit five dollar note on the Chester Bank, Chester, N. Y., is now being circulated in this State, and will probably soon make its appearance in this city. Fig. 1 female seated, with liberty pole, by an eagle, with figure 5, 5 on each upper corner. On lower right, figure of Justice standing; on left end, Comptroller's die, imitation of genuine.

STILL ARRIVING.—The country districts are doing far better than the city in sending in volunteers under the Governor's last call. There is scarcely a county in this Department that has not now a strong representation at Camp Curtin, and new companies are coming in every day. Several fine companies from this district came in yesterday, and others are expected to-day.

IN READING.—Major General Franz Sigel left Harrisburg Tuesday morning for Reading, and has taken up his quarters there at the Mansion House. In the afternoon of his arrival, he visited the camps, and was received with distinguished marks of honor and respect. Many of the citizens of Reading have waited upon the General since he has been with them, extending to him the hospitalities of the city.

NEW TWO-CENT STAMP.—The new two-cent stamp which has just been issued by the department to meet the demand created by the new law fixing the rate on drop letters, circulars, transient matter, &c., at two cents, is black in color, and bears a finely engraved head of Gen. Andrew Jackson. The portrait occupies nearly the entire surface of the stamp, and the character of the engraving is such that the process of defacement to which it must be subjected, is easily and effectually performed.

WOUNDED AND A PRISONER.—Lieutenant Colonel George F. M'Farland, of the One Hundred and Fifty-first regiment, F. V., was wounded and taken prisoner at the late battle of Gettysburg. Lieut. Col. M'Farland, was before he entered the service, proprietor and principal of the M'Allisterville Academy, Juniata county, and is well known in this city. Nine months ago he reached Harrisburg with a company of young men from M'Allisterville, many of whom were scholars in his school. He was promoted from a captain to a lieutenant colonel of this regiment at its formation, and has since filled the office with ability.

ESCAPED.—A young colored fellow, who was formerly in the employ of Professor Nelson, and rejoiced in the name of "Oakum," went to the army with a regiment of "New York Zouaves," and was captured at "Malvern Hill," on the Peninsula, Tuesday turned up in Reading. He states that he was serving General Stuart, and that on Sunday night last the General went out on a reconnaissance, leaving behind him his best horse. "Oakum" immediately mounted the favorite steed, and skedaddled into this city with him, leaving the rebel general to mourn the loss of his favorite charger. "Oakum" was compelled to give up the horse here, but retains possession of the General's blouse as a memento of the past.

TO BE MUSTERED OUT.—Captain Wellington Jones' company, at one time on provost duty in this city, is to be mustered out of service this afternoon. We noticed their return to Harrisburg from Washington several weeks ago, when their term of service had expired; but the men resolved to stay in service thirty days longer, if the Government should need them, and have done military duty ever since. Early this week they took 210 rebel prisoners to Fort Delaware, but could not return until yesterday morning, when arrangements were immediately made to have them mustered out of service. They intend to return home without delay, only to enlist again as soon as they shall have finished their visits to their relatives and friends. The company is from Schuylkill county.

MORE PRISONERS.—Yesterday evening one hundred and thirty-six rebel prisoners were in the city and Camp Curtin. A large number have since arrived from the Huntingdon district, and the whole lot will be sent away to-day. One hundred and thirty of them were brought down from Camp Curtin this morning, and placed under guard in the yard back of the Court House. A rebel captain was among the number, who, at one time, was a resident of Tioga county, in this State. Since Monday of last week, over seven hundred rebels have been brought to Harrisburg, as prisoners. Soldiers who arrive from the army by the way of Carlisle state that the whole hill country skirting the Cumberland Valley is said to be alive with men who have seceded from the seceders and turned their backs upon the tents of Jeff. General Lee's forces are concentrating in this city. A warner not laid down in any of the officers' orders.

NO NAME.—A curious specimen of a female African was arrested last evening, by Chief of Police Campbell, and conveyed to the lock-up. She shrieked and screamed in an awful manner both before and after her arrest, but cooled down before she had been in confinement half an hour. When brought before Alderman Kline this morning, she refused to give her name, and uttered and swore at nearly every one in the room. The Alderman committed her to prison for thirty days, giving her the appellation of "Miss No-Name."

GRAND INSTRUMENTAL CONCERT AT THE COURT HOUSE.—A grand concert, in behalf of the heroes of Gettysburg, will be given in the Court House, next Saturday evening. The 22d N. Y. S. Militia Regiment, under the direction of its leader, Mr. H. H. Miller, will participate, and direct the evening's entertainment. The concert is to be given under the auspices of the Ladies' Relief Society, and the U. S. Christian Commission. Too much cannot be said of this "best brass band in the country," and we are confident that the entertainment, under the auspices of Mr. H. H. Miller, will be one of the most amusing and instructive of the kind ever given in Harrisburg. Tickets can be purchased at the various book and drug stores in this city.

PROCEEDINGS OF CITY COUNCIL.—Council met at eight o'clock—President, Mr. H. H. Miller, in the chair. Eight members present. Minutes of previous meeting read and approved. Mayor's report was introduced, who made a few preliminary remarks relative to the contrabands now staying in city. He had received a petition numerous signed by the white residents in the Third ward, concerning the contrabands refugees stationed in Mason's Hall and several other buildings in Tanner's alley. He stated that the petitioners might be taken to prevent contagion in that quarter, and that a contagious nature had already made their appearance among them. He hoped that the Council would take some action in this matter. He also referred to the two companies of negroes recently raised in this city, stating that they had "turned in their arms" at other companies, and that the full regiment, under the command of Mr. H. H. Miller, was organized, he demonstrated with the heads of departments, urging them not to arm the negroes of this city, but they were armed regardless of his wishes, and they still retained their arms in their possession. He also had requested of the authorities that the contrabands be not allowed to take their children to their homes, this request had been complied with. He concluded by saying that he hoped the Council would ascertain why rations were distributed to these contrabands, and also make some arrangements to have them removed from the city.

The President presented a communication from Mr. George Berger, relative to letter boxes being placed on lamp posts at convenient distances in different streets in this city, and on the streets leading to the city. Mr. S. Schomaker offered a resolution, allowing the postmaster of the city to place letter boxes on any of the posts he may think proper and convenient for that purpose. Agreed to. Mr. S. Schomaker presented a petition from citizens living in the vicinity of Hockleyburg alley, praying for the construction of a sewer in said alley. Referred to members of the Council from Third ward.

Also, a petition signed by thirty or forty citizens in the neighborhood of Tanner's alley, in relation to the escaped contrabands now in the vicinity, praying that some measures be taken to prevent the spread of contagious diseases inaugurated by these negroes in that quarter. Laid on the table.

Mr. S. Schomaker offered a preamble and resolutions, asking that something be done to have these negroes removed beyond the limits of the city; also, to know by whose authority they are subsisted and provided with rations; and the reason they are retained in this locality. Mr. Hamilton moved to amend by striking out the resolution relating to the authority by which they are subsisted and provided with rations. Agreed to. Mr. S. Schomaker presented a resolution, that a committee be appointed to carry out the adopted resolutions, consisting of Messrs. Schomaker, Hamilton and Linn.

Mr. S. Schomaker moved to purchase the timepiece recently purchased by Mr. Fitch in the Second ward, and to have it used to level of the streets, most necessary in this city. Agreed to.

The President presented to the Council the check roll from the committee of the First district, amounting to \$194.84. Ordered to be paid.

The President also presented three small bills, Mr. Lou's, Peter H. H. Joseph Popel's. Ordered to be paid. Also two check bills from the committee of the Second district—\$26.12, and \$42.00. Ordered to be paid.

THE COMMISSARY DEPARTMENT.—Over sixty thousand rations were issued from the commissary department between six and twelve o'clock last night. Many of them were sent directly to the army. The commissary's and quartermaster's departments in this city are doing an immense business at the present time.

REACHED THEIR DESTINATION.—Captain E. P. Fitch, late depot quartermaster at Martinsburg, Va., arrived in Baltimore Tuesday, from this city, having in charge all the horses, wagons, mules, ambulances, sets of harness, &c., which he had when he left here, amounting to over one million of dollars. Many of them are the same wagons, horses, &c., which he had when he arrived in this city, some time since, in advance of Gen. Milroy's forces, when he retreated from Winchester. Capt. Fitch was accompanied by Courtland Ross and Geo. B. Dorsey, his superintendent of transportation and his forage master. When they reached Baltimore there were a number of troops with the train, including some from the Sixth Maryland Infantry, Alexander's Baltimore Battery and the whole of Company B, Maryland cavalry.

EXTRACT FROM THE MINUTES of a special meeting of the Ladies' Union Relief Association, held July 8th, 1863. The Ladies' Union Relief Association of Harrisburg require a moderate quantity of the following supplies, and none others, viz: Butter, eggs, onions, dried fruit, dried beef, tongue, and apple butter. These should be packed separately in small boxes, and marked *relief supplies*. Address care Quartermaster General, Harrisburg, Pa. The appeal is made only to the citizens of Dauphin, York, Juniata, Lancaster and Lebanon counties; these special supplies being intended for the sick and wounded of the hospitals of this place. The freight will be paid by the State if the railroad and express companies require it. The ladies who wish kind enough to take charge of dried fruit belonging to this Association, will please send it to the Association room in Walnut street, Arsenal ground.

ARREST OF SUSPECTED PICKPOCKETS.—Five young men were arrested in this city this morning, charged with being connected with the "light-fingered party" who have followed their vocation so successfully in this city the last few months. The evidence against one of them in particular was very strong, and unless he proves that he was not the person he is taken to be it will go rather hard with him. Testimony was given this morning before Alderman Kline strong enough to have him bound over for the next term of court, in August. We intend withholding the names of the parties until more evidence is given, and a true bill is made out. Since the above was in type, three of the party have proven themselves to be gentlemen of undoubted good character, from New York city. The other two were committed to prison to answer at the next court of Quarter Sessions. One of them, named Rogers, is charged with taking the pocket of Philip D. Dyer, Esq., of Mauch Chunk, last evening. The other prisoner is the celebrated Charles Burke, so well known by our Philadelphia politicians. He was sent to prison for ninety days.
