ORDERED HOME.—The Seventy-fourth New York Volunteer Militia, (Col. Fox,) passed through the city this morning on their way home.

REGIMENT ORGANIZED AT HUNTINGDON.—One regiment has been formed of the troops in camp at Huntingdon, and the organization completed by the election of the following officers:

Colonel—J. Lawrence, of Huntingdon county. Lieutenant Colonel—C. F. Huston, of Centre county. Major—Frank Bell, of Blair county.

PENNSYLVANIA TROOPS OFFERED TO THE GOVERNOR OF NEW YORK.—We understand that Governor Curtin has offered the services of some of the Pennsylvania militia to assist in quelling the riot in New York city, and to aid in enforcing the draft.

THE THIRTY-SIXTH PENNSYLVANIA MILITIA.—This regiment is now stationed at Gettysburg. Col. H. C. Alleman has been appointed commander of the town, and Lieut. Col. McClay is Provost Marshal.

CHANGED COMMANDERS.—Col. Beaver, formerly commander of Camp Simmons, has been relieved, and Captain James F. Ramsey has taken the position in his stead.

RESUMPTION OF TRAVEL.—The trains on the Northern Central railroad commenced running as usual yesterday, and travel between this city and Baltimore is again resumed.

THE HOPE PICNIC.—The grand picnic for the benefit of the Hope fire company will certainly take place at Hoffman's woods, on Saturday, the 25th, unless the weather shall prove unfavorable.

ORGANIZATION OF THE THIRTY-EIGHTH PENNSYLVANIA VOLUNTEER MILITIA.—The 38th Regiment of Pennsylvania Volunteer Militia, which is known as the "Iron Regiment" was armed and organized at Reading last week, and has since passed through this city to join General Meade's army, by way of Carlisle.

Colonel—A. J. Scholtz, of Harrisburg. Lieutenant Colonel—William H. Thompson, of Easton. Major—Thomas L. McKean, of South Easton.

THE SOLDIER'S FRIEND.—While we would give all honor to the brave and heroic soldiers, together with their able and skillful generals, who have fought the past battles for the Union, in all of which they have "freely bled and nobly died," still let us pay a tribute to the patriotic women, who, through all the hardships of camp life and the harrowing scenes of battle, have been angels of comfort to the sick, wounded and dying of all the hard fought battles of the Army of the Potomac.

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IN THE HOSPITAL.—Six rebel prisoners have recently been admitted into Camp Curtin Hospital, and are now under treatment.

DRUNK AND DISORDERLY.—An Irish woman was arrested by Officer Newman last night, and escorted to the lock-up.

ATTEMPTING TO PASS COUNTERFEIT MONEY.—A soldier, named Albert Earl, attempted to pass a counterfeit note at the "Gaiety" last night, but it was not so, and the note imposed upon, Frank Gembe, immediately made information and had him arrested.

ASSAULT AND BATTERY.—Yesterday afternoon, one John Daly made oath before Alderman Kline against an Irishman named John Connelly, for assault and battery.

RETURNED TO BE SWORN IN.—A cavalry company, enlisted for six months, under the command of Captain Moore, was drawn up in front of Captain Dodge's office, this morning, for the purpose of being sworn into the United States service.

FIRE.—About half-past two o'clock, this afternoon, an alarm of fire was struck by the Friendship fire bell, which proved to be a barn in Meadow lane, near Third street, owned by Mr. Jacob Zelger.

INTERESTING CASE OF LARCENY.—Yesterday afternoon information was made against Henry McClean, Thomas McClean and J. H. Dewey, by Chief of Police Campbell, and on oath of J. J. Clyde, Esq., they were arrested for the larceny of a valuable stock of porcelain ware, and two rolls of carpet.

Letter from Huntingdon. "CAMP JENNETTA," HUNTINGDON, July 16, 1868.

There are in this camp, at the present writing, eleven companies—six three months, four emergency, and one six months. A regiment will be formed out of this material so soon as it is made apparent that companies can be consolidated together, the term of service of which are of different lengths.

Captain John McKee, of Hollidaysburg, is commandant of the camp. He is said to be an accomplished soldier, and a gentleman as well. He commanded a Blair company during the six months of the late war.

The companies here are principally composed of Cambria, Blair, Clearfield and Centre men. They constitute a splendid assemblage of brave and stout, patriotic and intelligent—the true bulwark of our country's greatness.

The 46th Pennsylvania volunteer militia, Col. Lawrence, is encamped about a quarter of a mile from here. It is composed of two companies. The name of the camp they occupy is "Camp Warrior."

A cavalry company is quartered on a bluff overlooking town. Their camp is called "Camp Huntingdon."

It is universally conceded that Captain Letzinger's (Cambria county) company is the best drilled body of men here. The nicety and precision of their evolutions, considering the length of their campaign—of about one month's duration—is something wonderful.

THE ONE HUNDRED DOLLAR BOUNTY.—Men belonging to the two year regiments, which have been mustered out of service, may—although they enlisted some months after the regiment was mustered in, and have therefore not served the full two years—prefer a claim for the \$100 bounty to the Secretary of War, who will decide each case upon its merits.
