DEPARTURE OF A COLORED REGIMENT .- The 14 Andrew Haus Third U. S. colored regiment, numbering one 15 Joseph Negley thousand men, under command of Colonel C. 16 John Forrest B. Tilghman, (formerly of the 26th Pennsylvania,) and lately organize. 1 at Camp Penn, Chelton Hill, near Philadelphia, left their camp yesterday, proceeding by steam w to Morris Island, to reinforce General Gilmore 's army. This is the first colored regiment ever τ organized in Pennsylvania. The regiment is well officered and admitably drilled, and we hop to hear a good account of them.
