ARRIVAL OF REBEL PRISONERS.—Yesterday evening fifty-nine wounded rebel prisoners were brought to this city from Hagerstown, Md.

SCARCITY OF SUBSTITUTES.—We learn that several of our citizens, who engaged in the gift enterprise, are offering as high as two hundred and fifty dollars each for acceptable substitutes.

DEPARTURE OF A COLORED REGIMENT.—The Third U. S. colored regiment, numbering one thousand men, under command of Colonel B. T. Lightham, (formerly of the 26th Pennsylvania), and lately organized at Camp Penn, Chelton Hill, near Philadelphia, left this camp yesterday, proceeding by steam to Morris Island, to reinforce General Gillmore's army.

John Wostinger, a country Dutchman, was found in an intoxicated state, and placed in the lock-up over night. Was released on paying his fine (\$1 and costs).

DONNED THE WRONG ATTIRE.—A female dressed in "soger" clothes has been perambulating the streets of our city the past three days; but her features resembling somewhat those of a masculine, she was not noticed by the police until this morning, when her sex was made known by the unnecessary airs she was trying to "put on" while in a drinking saloon.

ARREST OF TWO PICKPOCKETS.—Chief of Police Campbell and Officer Kline yesterday evening arrested two pickpockets in the Gaiety, who gave their names as Francis A. Brown and Charles H. Young. The warrant was issued by Alderman Kline, on the complaint of Mr. Jacob Clinchman, a resident of Hagerstown, Md., who states that on Tuesday evening last he had his pockets picked by one of them of \$65 in gold and bank notes, and a valuable gold hunting case watch and chain—worth over \$150. The watch was found on Brown's person, but the money was not recovered. Before the prisoners reached the pavement in front of the Gaiety, on their way to the Alderman's office, Young escaped from the officers' custody, and endeavored to elude a recapture by flight. He succeeded, in reaching the Buchler House, in Second street, before he was overtaken by Barney, who handled him rather unceremoniously for his conduct. Alderman Kline committed them for trial.
