## Daily Telegraph

### Reports from Memphis and Below.

MEMPHIS, Aug. 15.  
The army under command of Gen. Banks can now be considered in summer quarters. General Banks is at New Orleans, but it is rumored that he was going home in a few days. His staff are to accompany him. General Whittier occupies the Teche country. General Franklin has superseded General Dudley in command at Baton Rouge. General Andrews continues in command at Port Hudson. The health of the troops, taking into consideration the season of the year, with the weather, is tolerable.

Gen. Herron is still two miles below Port Hudson, at Mount Pleasant Landing. His troops are in good health and spirits. But little is known of the movements of the rebels in the country back of the Mississippi. The river on both sides is being depopulated of white men and negroes suited for the field. Portions of Mississippi, back of Natchez, near Hattiesburg and Kingdon, which have never been visited by the conscription before, are now nearly laid waste. Every man capable of bearing arms is either conscripted or draftee. Those who can get to Natchez do so, and at once place themselves under the protection of Gen. Banks. About two hundred men, who had fled from the iron rule of conscription, arrived at Natchez on Saturday, and took the cash of all grants. They were mostly from the line of the Jackson and Mobile railroad.

On the 7th inst. an order was issued in New Orleans, placing the price of bread at twenty cents for fifty three ounces, and five cents for thirteen ounces. Any broker or dealer in bread, violating that order, was subject to fine and imprisonment.

Gen. Banks has issued an order regulating the sale of and to be made by steamboats and other vessels sailing between the ports of New Orleans and New York, and north to the Department of the Tennessee. The charges for a cabin passenger, are twenty five for a berth and fifty cents for a meal; and deck passengers to eat at a second table, fifteen cents per meal.

Gen. Albert Pearce arrived at New Orleans on the 6th, and was advertised to sail for St. Louis with the mail on the 10th. Greenbacks sold at 14 premium for currency, and 2 to 3 per cent for exchange on New York. Gold was dull at 34 to 36, and silver at 24 to 25 premium.

The steamers to New Orleans on the 9th were the Meteor, Chancellor, Pearce and Russell. Nothing new from Vicksburg. Skunks remain for the past few days, to be abating. The expedition under Gen. Steele, has, so far, been very successful. The river hence to Cairo has lighted and a half feet in the channel, and to New Orleans nine feet.

Gen. Grant has relieved the press of Memphis from a censor.

### The Draft in New York All Quiet

NEW YORK, Aug. 19, Evening.  
The draft to-day has proceeded without demonstration than jolly remarks relative to the elected. The military arrangements, however, will continue of the most perfect character, and Gen. Canby, who commands the Government force here, is unceasing in his vigilance, remaining with his staff at headquarters day and night. It is proper to state, that through the measures taken by this office, a mob could not exist one hour either in New York city or Brooklyn.

About one thousand names were drawn to-day. The militia are all at their armories, but will not be called upon unless private property cannot be protected by the police.

The Provost Marshal and other Government officials are fully protected by detachments of the 37th Massachusetts and other regiments.

### The Mississippi River.

CAIRO, Aug. 18.  
The following notice has been made public: U. S. SQUADRON, FLAG SHIP BLACK HAWK, Cairo, August 17, 1863.

Vessels are now stationed at all points on the Mississippi, on the way to New Orleans, where their duty is to be kept on duty, and their crews, and vessels need not wait for convoy. If any guerrillas are on the river, vessels at different points will notify transports and convoy them past the danger.

A wooding station will soon be in operation at White River, under protection of gunboats, and an committee will be organized. Other stations will be protected as parties offer to collect wood for steamers.

### Death of Capt. Cannon.

HAVEY DE GRAC, August 19.  
Capt. W. L. Cannon of the 1st Delaware cavalry, son of Governor Cannon, died yesterday at Bellair, Md. His death was caused by fatigue and exposure incidental to his duties.

### FROM NEW ORLEANS.

NEW YORK, Aug. 18.  
The steamer Columbus has arrived from New Orleans with dates to the 18th. The papers are barren of news.

### EFFECT OF A LOVER'S QUARREL.

—In Cincinnati, on Sunday night, Belle McCormick, a young woman, committed suicide by drowning herself. It seems that she was engaged to be married, but, owing to some misunderstanding with her betrothed, a coolness sprang up. The night previous the young man to whom she was engaged passed her house several times, with another young lady, probably to plume the former, but his cruel iness was attended by the sorrowful result we are noting. During the night, Miss McCormick went to the river near her residence, and committed her grief to the merciless waves. The Cleveland Wool Market.—The Cleveland Wool Growers' Association has been organized for some weeks past. Medium clip wools brought in from neighboring counties, in large lots, and are taken at prices varying from sixty-two to sixty five cents, the latter figure being paid for such the larger portion. At these prices growers are more freely offered to sell than dealers are to purchase. Still some lent by large parties are being taken to establish lots, so that we should regard ourselves as saying that an average price for the wools of this vicinity may be stated at sixty five.

THE BADGE SYSTEM IN THE ARMY.—The system of giving badges to the members of each corps of the Army of the Potomac was originated by Major General Butterfield, while he was chief of General Hooker's staff. Under the most beneficial effects have been produced. Good soldiers wear this badge with pride as an emblem of honor. Soldiers who were addicted to straggling feared to do so while wearing the emblem, as they would be at once pointed out and disgraced. They feared to remove the badge, as its absence would lead to inquiry and punishment by the provost guard. The badge system in this way serves to check straggling and desertion. It is still in operation and is highly approved by General Meade.
