

ANOTHER REED STEAMER EXPLODED—THE ENTIRE CREW KILLED AND WOUNDED-ALARM ABOUT ROSECRANS' MOVEMENTS.

The Port Boyal New South publishes some interesting information from Savannah, gathered from papers of that ci extract the following: pers of that city of the 8th inst. We

"The rebel steamer Robert Habersham, which has been occupied in watching our advance movement up the Savannah river, was entirely destroyed by an explosion of her boiler, while lying off Sorieven's Ferry, on the morning of the 8th inst. The entire crew were either killed or mortally wounded.
"A special order has been issued by Brigadier

General Mercer, in command at Savannah, impressing into the rebel service one fifth of the able bodied male slaves in Eastern, Southern and Southwestern Georgia, for the purpose of erecling additional fortifications for the defence of Savannah. "Transportation will be fur-nished them, and wages paid at the rate of twenty-five dollars per month. The Government will be responsible for the value of such negroes as may be killed by the enemy, or in

any manner fall into his bands.'
"All the free blacks in Savannah have bee "All the free blacks in Savannan have been seeized and put to work upon the fortifications, and no negroes are allowed to leave the city on any pretext whatever.
