**A VOICE FROM THE COTTON FACTORY HOSPITAL.**—The Soldiers' Unanimous for the Soldiers' Candidate for Governor—At a meeting held in the Cotton Factory Hospital, in which all the patients able to leave their beds participated, the subject of the recent cowardly misrepresentations of the *Tory Organ*, in reference to the attachments of the soldiers for Gov. Curtin, was fully discussed. The spirit of the meeting was of a most enthusiastic character, and after giving the clearest expressions of their preference for Gov. Curtin, the following preamble and resolutions were unanimously adopted:

**WHEREAS,** An article appeared in the *Patriot and Union* newspaper of the 2d inst., headed "Governor Curtin and the Soldiers," entering upon the firm protest against Governor Curtin visiting the Pennsylvania soldiers, whether in the camp, upon the battle field, or in the hospitals suffering from wounds received upon hard fought battle fields; and also charging the Governor's friends with hounding and abusing the hospitals for wounded soldiers; and the *Patriot and Union* must think weak and easily influenced minds of the Pennsylvania soldiers; and whereas, the sole object of the article being, in our opinion, to impress upon the minds of our friends at home, the false idea that Governor Andrew G. Curtin's kind efforts in behalf of Pennsylvania soldiers have been merely the witchcraft of a designing political demagogue; and that the placing of the Governor's portrait in the hospitals was or may be contrary to the wishes of the soldiers—therefore, be it resolved unanimously by every Pennsylvania soldier in the Cotton Factory Hospital:

1. That Governor Curtin's kind and humane attention and efforts in our behalf have ever been and ever shall be looked upon by us as the promptings of that generosity and patriotism which are characteristics of the Governor, but which we know Woodward and his copperhead friends are incapable of possessing these times.

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3. That Governor Curtin's past career as a whole-souled fellow—a model of a landlord—and we advise our readers visiting Washington, who appreciate good fare, elegant rooms, and a clean, quiet, home-like home, to give him a call.

4. That we, as soldiers and as citizens, have forgotten party names and party party distinctions; that men must now be either "for or against" the Government, and we being for the Government—Union to the core—denounce the contemptible, dastardly efforts of those who wish "peace on any terms" to vilify the character of a man who has proven himself to be a friend of those who have placed themselves as a wall between their homes and their enemies.

5. That if the editor of the *Patriot and Union* or any of his friends, think the portrait of Governor Curtin obnoxious to the soldiers of our hospital, that this be an invitation for him, or any of them, to come and take it down if, after they arrive, they consider it expedient.
