THE REPULSE AT FORT SUMTER

OFFICIAL DISPATCHES OF BEAUREGARD. FORT MONROE, Sept. 12.—The Richmond In-uirer of the 12 h, received by the flag of truce,

ntains the following dispatches : CHARLESTON, Sept. 9—To Gen. Cooper:—Last with the army of the Potomac, wries under date of the 10th instant:—It is believed that one corps of Lee's army, under Longstrect, is moving to Richmond, there to be transfered to divisions to the south west and one to Charlesgunboat ram, were thrown on, but the enemy was repulsed, leaving 113 prisoners and 13 offi-cers, including four boats and three colors.

(Signed) G. T. BEAUREGARD. The enemy is silent to-day. Gen. Beauregard refused to have any communication with the Yankee's flag of truce until an explanation is given of their firing on a truce boat. We took the original flag of Fort Sumter which Major Anderson was compelled to lower, and which Dahlgren had hoped to replace.
