### THE MAINE ELECTION!

**Great Union Gains!**

PORTLAND, Me., Sept. 14.—Evening. The following returns have been received: For Governor, Bath gives Cony, Union candidate, 1,021; Bradbury, Democratic candidate, 325.

Lewiston gives Cony a majority of 560. Auburn gives Cony 76 majority. Intelligence from west of the Kennebec shows strong Republican gains. The vote of this city is not counted, but the majority for the Union ticket will probably be over 600.

**LATER.** The following additional returns have just come in: Augusta gives Cony, for Governor, 396 majority, which is a large Union gain. Scarborough gives Cony 1,678, and Bradbury 329. Saco gives Cony 678, and Bradbury 380—Union gain of 314.

**From the Army of the Potomac.** ADVANCE OF GEN. PLEASANTON TO THE RAPIDAN. Three Pieces of Artillery Captured.

HEADQUARTERS ARMY OF POTOMAC, Sept. 14. Gen. Pleasanton has advanced to the Rapidan. The rebels were in position, with infantry, artillery and cavalry, to prevent our crossing. Our casualties yesterday were 3 killed and 40 wounded. Among the latter was Gen. Custar, not seriously. He commanded a brigade in the 2nd Cavalry division, and was wounded while gallantly charging a battery of the enemy, in which charge three guns were captured.

**Foreign News by Steamship Arabia.** Earl Russell's reply to the Emancipation Society, relative to the funding of arms for the Confederate States by the Messrs. Lairds, is written in a tone of undisguised disapproval, but he says nothing can be done without affidavits.

The Paris Times denies the official character of the pamphlet advocating a recognition of the Confederacy. The Minister explains that the Florida was only permitted to make indispensable repairs at Bristol.

The Liverpool Post says it now appears that the steam rams launched from Lairds' yards were built for the Confederate service.

Neither the French Government or the French people were once named in the business, although a French banker was connected with the scheme financially—the name to be paid out of the Confederate loan. Mr. Laird was one of the contractors for that loan, and was also guarantee for the payment of the contract with Mr. Laird.

He has a mortgage on both vessel, and therefore they may ultimately become his property. But when the law would have to deal with these new features in the transaction, and the Laird might sell them to the British Government at cost price, and they are well worth the money, not for sale but for coast and harbor service. For privateers they are totally unfit.

The Paris Times states that the two ships were not constructed for the French Government, but had been ordered by the government of the Confederate States. The Paris Times says the Florida, falling under Confederate flags, entered Bristol to repair damages. Her reception was according to international law.

At the opening of the war, the French Government, in accord with the other powers, recognized the Confederate States as belligerents and declared its intention of observing a strict neutrality between the two parties. In like cases, it is the right of all vessels of the duty of neutrals to permit the vessels of belligerents to procure means, not for fighting purposes, but for navigation.

Therefore, it has been decided that the Florida could be admitted to procure all that was indispensable to maintain her in a good navigable state, without her being able to make purchases tending to her war arrangements.

The London Times publishes some particulars of the Florida's career, as related by Captain Mailli.

He claims to have treated all his prisoners of war with the greatest respect. He says the Anglo Saxon was captured sixty miles from Cork.

When she was captured her pilot was referred to the Confederate government for the settlement of any just claim he might have.

Capt. Mailli said as to his quitting Bristol, that he expected there would be seven or eight Federal war vessels outside the only narrow straits.

**THE LATEST.** LIVERPOOL, Sept. 5.—The steamer China arrived here at two o'clock this afternoon. The stock exchange was closed to-day, so the result of her news on American securities was not developed. The bombardment of Charleston had further depressed the Confederate loan. No business was done, but it was nominally called at 35/40 per cent. discount.

## FROM WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 14. **GENERAL BURRISSE'S RESIGNATION.** The President has received the resignation of General Burrisse, but refuses to accept it, and requests him to remain in command in East Tennessee, which he has liberated from rebel control.

**OUR MEXICAN RELATIONS.** Senor Romero, the Mexican Minister, still remains in Washington, and, if it is understood, holds official intercourse with our Government, which continues to recognize the Juarez Government, no official announcement of the establishment of the monarchy in Mexico having yet been received. Whether the new Government of Mexico will be recognized when this announcement is received excites considerable speculation in diplomatic circles.

**GENERAL GILMORE ASKS INSTRUCTIONS.** It is reported that a letter has been received here from General Gilmore, which states that he is now in a position to shell Charleston, but before doing so asks whether he would be justified under the laws of nations in bombarding the city, so as to result in the destruction of the establishment of the monarchy in Mexico having yet been received. Whether the new Government of Mexico will be recognized when this announcement is received excites considerable speculation in diplomatic circles.

**IMPORTANT DECISION.** On Saturday the following important decision of Judge Holt was issued by the Provost Marshal General: "Under the thirteenth section of the enrollment act, it is clear that a party drafted and wishing to furnish a substitute or pay the commutation, must do so on or before the day fixed for his appearance. The privilege expires with that day.

If he fails to report himself and is arrested as a deserter, he has still the right to go before the Board of Enrollment, and prove that he is not liable to do military duty; but if, on hearing his claim to exemption he is held to be liable, he cannot escape personal service. He is also, under such circumstances, subject to be proceeded against as a deserter."

**THE WORK AT THE NAVY YARDS.** The Secretary of the Navy having returned from his brief visit to the several navy yards, expresses his gratification with the progress making in the construction and repair of vessels, and the energy with which every branch of the varied business of the yards is conducted. The number of men employed was never greater than at the present time.

**THE QUOTA OF INDIANA.** The report of Adjutant General Abb, of Indiana, has been received at the War Department, and does credit to the loyalty and patriotism of Indiana; 25,000 men were furnished for the war in excess of the
