**SENATORIAL CONFERENCE.**—The Union Conference of Mercer, Lawrence and Venango counties, have nominated Hon. Thomas Hoge for State Senator, to represent the 22d District.

**CAPT. A. J. STEVENS,** nephew of Hon. Thaddeus Stevens, was killed in the battle near Chattanooga, on Sunday. He commanded the Pennsylvania Independent Battery, in the Army of the Cumberland, and was a brave and faithful officer.

**INFANTICIDE.**—A new born child was found dead in a stable loft in the North precinct, West Chester, on the 15th inst. A colored woman had been seen in the stable in the afternoon of that day, who complained of being very sick; but she had disappeared before night.

**SUDDEN DEATH.**—The wife of Mr. Henry Boyer, of Upper Providence township, Montgomery county, was apparently well and healthy, but on last Saturday evening, the 12th inst., she complained of being unwell and went up stairs to lie down, when her daughter, who went up to see if she wanted anything, found her sitting in the rocking chair dead. It is believed she died of heart disease.

**GOOD GRIT.**—We heard a "good un" the other day, which we give as an instance of genuine grit: "A couple were engaged to be married, and every preparation was made to celebrate the nuptials, but the bridegroom did not appear. A messenger, however, brought the news to the waiting party that he had been drafted in Carlisle and could not leave. The reply of the young lady was worthy of the occasion—With tear drops glistening in her eyes, and her heart ready to burst with grief, she turned to the company and said: "I don't keer a darn; there's plenty more men in the world anyhow."

**THE ARMY HOSPITALS.**—During the past week 463 soldiers were returned to duty from the army hospitals of this department, 63 were discharged and 18 died. The number remaining in 9,189, according to the following distribution: West Philadelphia, 2,116; Chestnut Hill, 1,671; Chester, 1,167; York, 797; Nicotown, 628; Broad and Cherry, 542; Germantown, 445; Summit House, 421; Christian street, 230; Filbert street, 222; Turner's Lane, 202; Twenty-fourth and South, 256; Sixty-fifth and Vine, 181; Broad and Prime, 100; Chestnut street, Harrisburg, 74; Mulberry street, Harrisburg, 67; West Walnut street, Harrisburg, 61; Canaca's Woods, 39; Fort Mifflin, 31; Ishington Lane, 4.

It is said that the incense to the Government from the Pennsylvania oil wells amounts to \$5,000,000 a year.

**SYNDICATE.**—The annual session of the Synod of the German Reformed church, in the United States, will commence on Wednesday, October 21st, in the German Reformed church at Carlisle, Pa.

**THE LAST DODGE** of the conscript deserters is to do a Confederate uniform, and come into camp as deserters. They are then sent to Washington, take the oath of allegiance and are forwarded North. Seven were caught at this game last week.

**LOOK OUT FOR FIRES.**—Now that the time has arrived for the use of stoves and grates, too much care cannot be taken to guard against fire. Your stove pipes should be carefully examined, and, where necessary, repaired, while particular care should be taken that there is no wood work in contact with them. Defective flues should also be examined and put in order, and care taken that the cinders and ashes are deposited in such a way as to prevent the possibility of accident from this source.

**THE Erie Gazette** gives the vote of Colonel Brown's regiment, the 145th, for Governor, as taken on the 9th instant, and certified by the Major, Adjutant and a Captain. It stood, officers, Curtin 15, Woodward 00. Enlisted men, Curtin 171, Woodward 4. Total, Curtin, 186, Woodward 4. How the Democrats all go to the war! And how they would vote the Democratic ticket if Woodward hadn't disfranchised them.

**IDENTIFIED.**—The chisels and other tools found in the possession of the man who was discovered on the premises of Mr. Henry Thomas, yesterday morning, have been identified as those stolen from the shop of Mr. Joseph F. Kephart, some time ago—an account of which was published in our columns. No doubt exists in regard to the intentions of the man in whose possession the tools were discovered. Had he not feigned illness, the contents of the German's pistol would have prevented his escape.

**TWO MEN KILLED.**—A man named Reel was killed yesterday afternoon, some five miles below this city, at a point where the Pennsylvania railroad crosses the canal. It appears that he was a boatman, and his horses becoming frightened, he was by them thrown in contact with a passing train and instantly killed.

We learn that a man was killed on the Middletown pike, yesterday, by a horse kicking him. He was driving a team at the time, and the horses were frightened by a train of cars passing near by the scene of the accident.

**IMPORTANT OPINION.**—Provost Marshal General Fry has issued the following "opinion" in reference to drafted men who have failed to report, and after being arrested claim the privilege of paying commutation or furnishing a substitute:

"If he fails to report himself, and is arrested as a deserter, he has still the right to go before the Board of Enrollment, and prove that he is liable to do military duty; but if on hearing his claim to exemption, he is held to be liable, cannot escape personal service. He is, also, under such circumstances, subjected to be proceeded against as a deserter."

**BE ASSESSED.**—We hope the Union voters will not fail to be assessed immediately. Friday of next week, (Oct. 2d,) is the last day on which it can be attended to. The assessor is bound to assess you if called upon ten days before the election. He is not the judge of the election, and cannot refuse to assess you on any ground whatever. The election officers are the proper persons to decide whether you are entitled to vote or not. The following are the assessors in this city: First Ward, John Knepley; Second Ward, Nicholas Zollinger; Third Ward, J. S. Royal; Fourth Ward, J. B. Tomlinson; Fifth Ward, S. C. Weistling; Sixth Ward, Jacob Barnhart.
