Run-off.—On Saturday evening a horse that was being driven in an alley by Capt. Hamilton, started to run, and could not be checked until he ran into the Lutheran church yard, breaking down the gate, and considerably damaging the buggy.

NOT TO BE DISCHARGED.—We stated on Saturday that the men composing the First Provost Battalion were to be discharged. An order was received countermanding the order for their discharge.

PUBLIC SCHOOLS.—The male department of the Public Schools of the South Ward, taught by Mr. Worley, Mr. Bisling and Mr. Lloyd, will commence their sessions to-morrow morning, in the building formerly occupied for school purposes, situated at the corner of Cherry and Raspberry alleys.

The Organ's local is pitching into the Government for all living soldiers absent from the army, to report until the 15th inst., without receiving the penalty of desertion, on the ground that they will have time to vote.

Mrs. HARRIS, whose name is familiar to every soldier in the Army of the Potomac—and who has devoted her time and attention to the suffering soldiers in the hospitals in Virginia—passed through this city at noon to-day, en route for Nashville, Tennessee, where she will continue her labors of love.

ISAAC VANCE, Michael Goudley and Samuel Foltz, residing at Round Top Mills, in this county, were arrested on Saturday, by officers Campbell and Massey, of this city, for riot and assault.

UNION MEETINGS will be held in Dauphin county, this week, as follows: Monday evening—M'Kee's Tavern, in Reed township.

GRAND RALLY in Harrisburg, on Monday evening, October 12. Let the people turn out and hear the truth, at the above meetings!

The CITY COUNCIL, at its last meeting, resolved to reduce the police force to one half the number authorized by the resolution adopted by the Council on the 7th of last June.

DEBAY MEETING POSTPONED.—The three of holding the Union meeting, at Hocker's Tavern, in Derry township, has been changed from Thursday to Friday evening of this week, on account of an exhibition that is to be given in the neighborhood, on Thursday evening.

"SHALL THEY COME!"—Three car loads of wounded soldiers from the Gettysburg hospitals arrived here at noon to-day. They are "home-ward bound." Many of them have lost limbs, and all of them are badly crippled. It grieves the "Gops" to see these poor cripples getting home before election day, as their votes will tell who has been the "soldiers' friend."

UNION MEETING AT LYKENA.—A large and enthusiastic meeting of the supporters of the Government and the lovers of the Union, was held at the public house of Mr. Hoffman, in Lykena, on Saturday evening. The following officers constituted the organization of the meeting: President—James Ferree, Esq. Vice Presidents—George Hiney, Frank Feindt, Edward Frankenkfield, Charles J. Miller, W. W. Jones, Phillip Hawk, John P. Hoffman, William Medary and Frank Whitman.

Interesting, telling and impressive speeches were made by Hon. David Fleming, A. C. Smith, Esq., and Col. H. C. Allen. Lykena township will poll a larger majority at the coming election for the Union ticket than was ever before given.

REV. J. WALKER JACKSON on Andrew Jackson.—Our friends will of course not forget to be present in the Locust street M. E. Church, to-morrow evening, to hear Rev. J. Walker Jackson pronounce his lecture on Andrew Jackson. The object of the lecture is to raise a certain sum of money to liquidate what debt yet remains on the Bidge Avenue M. E. Church.

POLICE AFFAIRS.—Before Alderman Kline.—A brick-layer named John Stevenson, charged with assault and battery on ELLIS R. WILLIAMS, (a boarder at the Bachelor House), was arrested by Chief-of-Police Campbell. Williams was walking back of the Capitol, near the corner of Fourth and State streets, at a late hour on Saturday night. Stevenson met him and sent a brick at his head, which stunned him considerably, and then endeavored to pick his pocket, but failed. The same evening, and previous to the above occurrence, Stevenson assaulted Tobias Fester with a hatchet, and came near cutting a hole in his head. The Alderman was proper to commit him to jail for trial. A very excellent decision.

DAVID STEVENS, a colored boy who is employed at the Baubler House, was taken before the Alderman on suspicion of having taken two pocket books from John Clemans, who is employed at the same House. There was no positive evidence in this case. Stevens, who is naturally hard to rouse when asleep, was up at an unreasonable hour yesterday morning. This led Clemans to suspect him of the theft, as the pocket books disappeared during the night. David was committed for a further hearing.

George Roach, a resident of Filbert street, drew a pistol on officer Campbell, as the latter was going home at a late hour on Saturday night. Roach was drunk, and his conduct was outrageous. When spoken to by Barney, George presented a loaded pistol at the head of the former, and threatened to blow out his brains. Barney seized George's wrist, and turned the pistol in another direction. A neighbor arriving, assisted the officer, when the pistol was secured, and the offender arrested. The Alderman committed him to prison for three days.

Hugh H. Smith, a soldier, had a "load" on Saturday night, and his brains being somewhat muddled, he flourished a knife in a very bad style, endangering the persons of those within his reach. Officer Kane thought he was a fit subject for the lock up, and he was furnished with quarters in that institution. He was discharged, yesterday morning, after paying a fine.

Patrick Murley and John Molby, who were placed in the lock-up on Saturday afternoon for drunkenness, attempted to "leave their bed and board," by digging a hole through the wall of the building. They had nearly succeeded before being discovered. They were committed for three days for the offence.

The following drunks were discharged from the lock-up yesterday morning: Hugh H. Smith, arrested by Kane; George Gallagher, arrested by Massey; Edward Stoner, arrested by Coslet; Jacob Waller, arrested by Esig; John Boney, arrested by Lloyd; Henry Herr, arrested by Esig.

Joseph Thoma, a vagrant, was furnished with lodging in the prison, last night. When interrogated by the Alderman, as to where he was from, &c., he replied that he was from the Baltimore penitentiary, and was on his way to the East Indies. He was supposed to be partially insane, and was discharged this morning.

ASSESSMENT OF DAMAGES.
