TERRIBLE OUTBREAKING OF THE DEMOCRACY.—The *Cyrus* promised the Carlisle "mass meeting" a "big lift" from this city, to-day. The train left here at the regular time this morning, for Chambersburg, with five cars, including that used for baggage, &c. No. 1 contained baggage and dalkies; No. 2 was filled with men, including passengers for the various points along the road; No. 3, ladies' car; No. 4 contained perhaps twelve persons; No. 5, empty. At the very highest calculation, there could not have been over fifty half-price-copperhead tickets sold. There were not over one hundred and thirty persons on the train, including ladies and gentlemen passengers; copperheads and dalkies. What a "big lift!"

GRAND UNION RALLY IN CONEWAGO.—A very large and enthusiastic meeting of the friends of the Union was held at Folts's store, in Conewago township, last evening. It was perhaps the largest, most interesting and most enthusiastic gathering ever convened in this township. The voters in this township are nearly all on the side of the Union, and promise a larger majority for the Union ticket than there ever have votes heretofore been polled in this township. The honest yeomanry of Conewago are on the side of the Government, and are determined to prove their patriotism by coming out to the election on next Tuesday and vote a solid Union ticket.

The meeting was called to order by John H. Folts, Esq., and the following gentlemen acted as officers of the meeting:

Vice Presidents—Abraham Bower and John M. Shenk.

Secretaries—Israel B. Davis and John H. Cole.
Great, sound patriotic speeches were made by Col. H. C. Alleman, Capt. Joseph Garretson, A. C. Smith, Esq., and Daniel W. Miller, Esq. The last named gentleman has been a life-long Democrat, and never voted any other than a Democratic ticket; but he is now openly for Curtin and the whole Union ticket, and vehemently denounces the traitorous actions of his old party. His influence will be felt at the ensuing election. The young men of Conewago are determined to make their township the banner township of the county, and to this end they are laboring zealously and indefatigably. Hurrah for Conewago.

SALE OF PRIZE COTTON.

A lot of prize cotton was sold at Philadelphia, yesterday, at from 90¢ to 92¢ cents per pound. It had been captured on the steamer Kate Dale.

There will be a grand mass meeting at New Bloomfield, Perry county, on Saturday next. Also, one at Carlisle, on the same day. The loyal people are wide awake in Cumberland and Perry.

SERVED HIM RIGHT.—An individual who was detected in smuggling liquor to the soldiers at the garrison at Carlisle, a few days ago, contrary to regulations, was tied up to a tree and afterwards drummed off the premises.

AHEAD OF TIME.—The Chambersburg Times contains an "Address of the Democratic State Central Committee," dated Sept 16, 1893. By that time the copperheads will all be in their holes—so deep that they will never be heard from again.

POLICE AFFAIRS.—John Alder, an old offender, was up for drunkenness again, having been arrested by officer Fry. Alderman Kline committed him to prison for five days.

Andrew Turley was arrested by officer Campbell, for drunkenness. After a hearing, this morning, he was discharged.

ARREST OF A SWINDLER.—Yesterday, Chief of Police Campbell arrived here from Philadelphia, having in charge a man named Samuel C. Johnson, who is charged with having obtained money under false pretences. It appears that he succeeded, by misrepresentation, in getting Mr. Henry Omit, of this city, to endorse his note for \$375, about a year ago. One of our banish cashed the note, Johnson failed to pay it when due, and it was protested. Johnson was prosecuted by Omit and gave bail to appear at Court, but failed to appear. He is now in prison for trial at next Court. We presume he will not get away again.

THEATRIAN ASSOCIATION.—A society entitled the "Harrisburg Theatrical Association" has been organized by a number of our young men, for mutual improvement and the entertainment of the public. It is their design to give frequent theatrical exhibitions, for benevolent purposes, and they will make it a point to have their entertainments free from all objectionable features. The object is worthy of encouragement, and we have no doubt that their exhibitions will be liberally patronized. They design giving their first performance in Brant's Hall, in a week or two, when our citizens will have an opportunity to judge of the merits of the association.

LIBERAL BOUNTIES.—The enrollment boards of some of the districts in this State, and doubtless also in other States, have received orders from the War Department to open recruiting offices, and to pay to all recruits the bounties now authorized by the Government, namely, \$402 for veterans, or men who have been in the service for a period of nine months or more, and have been honorably discharged; and \$300 for new recruits, or men who have been in the service for a less period than nine months. It would seem by this that the payment of \$402 to veteran volunteers, which expressed by limitation on the 25th ult., is to be revived, and continued. The plan is a sensible one.

RAILROAD ACCIDENT.—Last night about nine o'clock, Edward McCarroll, a private in Co. E, 69th Reg. Penna. Vols., when crossing the track of the Lebanon Valley Railroad, near the depot in this city, was caught by a locomotive and horribly mangled. One of his legs was broken and the other torn to atoms, and his head was considerably bruised. He was carried to the Chestnut Street Hospital, where he was promptly attended to by the physicians, but owing to great loss of blood, the soldier died at five o'clock this morning. Mr. McCarroll bore a reputation to Philadelphia, and was on his way home, on furlough, from the Gettysburg hospital. His remains were sent home for interment.

IN A PENNSYLVANIA REGIMENT AT CHICKAMAUGA.—A letter from Col. Hambricht, of the seventy-ninth Pennsylvania regiment, dated Sept. 24th, says:

Col. Miles is missing. The last I saw of him was on Saturday night, but the darkness prevented me from knowing his fate. My opinion is that he is wounded and a prisoner. The seventy-ninth has lost about 140 officers and men, and it is a miracle that any of us are living after being exposed to such a terrible fire. I have now only 180 men fit for duty.

Lieut. James D. Haus, of Co. K, 77th Penna., has written home to his parents, and says that the regiment suffered very much in the recent battles, and that nearly all the officers were taken prisoners. Among those he mentions the following—Col. Rose, Lt. Col. Pyfer, Maj. Phillips, Capt. Shroud, McDowell and Robinson, and Lieut. Cochran, Carbett and Orrepps. The regiment lost 114 killed, wounded and missing. Col. Rose, commanding the regiment, is from Pittsburg, and Major Phillips from Scranton. The regiment was originally formed of companies from Lancaster, Luzerne, Franklin and Allegheny.

RELIEF OF THE WOODS' SICKNESS.

Contributions of clothing, fruits (foreign and domestic), farm produce, particularly butter, delicacies, (corn starch, farina, &c.) wines, groceries and whatever may relieve our sick and wounded soldiers, are requested to be left at the store room of George A. Osgelby, Second street.

A box will be sent at once to Chattanooga, and others forwarded as stores collect, by a committee of the Christian Association of this city, which is now represented by a delegate present with the Army of Roscrans.

The Richmond Dispatch speaks in the very highest terms of the manner in which the Scotch ladies of Harrisburg fondled and treated the rebel wounded, recently in our hospitals. It says "the treatment was most humane," and the accounts given by rebels "are cheerful rays in the dark history of Yankee hospitals." When it is known that the rebel wounded always receive the same treatment that is bestowed on our own men, we think the special compliment of the Dispatch will not create a very favorable opinion here as to the loyalty of those ladies who so fondly caressed the rebels and at the same time turned up their noses at the Union soldiers, who were also occupants of our hospitals, and needed care and attention.
