The pleasant county, town of Adair, has been cursed by two recent visits from guerrilla bands. On both occasions, as soon as they entered the town, they commenced the indiscriminate robbery of every one in the streets, taking watches, money, and valuables, with pistole presented in unpleasant proximity to their victim's heads.
