JOHN H. O'NEIL, U. S. Military telegraph operator, of Pittsburg, died at Alexandria, Va., of typhoid fever, on Wednesday.

HIGH-PRIEST SOLDIERS.—The Organ speaks of "\$1,276,000 soldiers raised for the war."

RAIN commenced falling late last night, and continued through the forenoon. It will be very refreshing to the growing grain.

MARKET.—Our market was not as brisk as usual, this morning, owing to the rain. Prices were about the same as heretofore.

THE rumor in circulation here, to-day, of the death of Gov. Curtin, is a canard. The latest intelligence received from him, at headquarters, stated that he was enjoying good health.

MIDDLETOWN ITEMS.—The Journal says that diphtheria is prevailing to a considerable extent in that town and neighborhood.

East Pennsylvania Eldership of the Church of God convened in the Bethel on Wednesday evening. The opening sermon was preached by Rev. E. H. Thomas.

Henry Streiner has been appointed market master. An election for directors of the Bank of Middletown will be held on Monday, November 16th.

The bill offered for this evening by the Harrisburg Thespian Society, is the best presented this season to the citizens of this city. It is the aim of the Society to amuse the public, and at the same time do good to the needy by donating the profits to charitable purposes.

A GRAND PAINTING.—Yesterday, we visited the studio of our young artist friend, Mr. Harry H. Davis, and found him giving the finishing touches to his painting of the great Battle of Gettysburg. It is a fine picture, and will be greatly admired when exhibited.

THE result of the charge of Pickett's men is well known. Out of the three brigades which made the charge, about two hundred men made their escape, carrying with them a single battle flag, the only one saved out of sixteen which they brought into the charge with them.

Gov. Ohio, has sent an agent (D. W. Brown) to inter the bodies of the Ohio soldiers who fell in battle there, in the National bury.

THE Mill of Philadelphia has agreed to raise the price of milk to seven cents per quart. The "milk fluid" has heretofore been sold at six cents.

On Tuesday, a large and beautiful flag was raised on the flag pole of Round Top, on the breezin hill, where it now floats in the breeze in honor of the great victory achieved there in July.

GERMAN REFORMED Rev. Mr. Fox, of the German Reformed Church, will preach in the German language in Good Will Engine House, on Ridge Street, tomorrow (Sunday) morning, at 10 o'clock.

WE understand from a reliable source that the amount of commutation money paid in this (Cumberland, Perry) Congressional District is over \$350,000. At four hundred drafted men from the District will enter the service. Counting the men and the commutation money paid, it will not only furnish its quota, but it will have a small excess.
